

## **Alternative Education Options**


#### Students in all alternative settings may be:

- Experiencing homelessness, addiction, violence, mental health issues, gang involvement, juvenile justice system, foster system, pregnant or parenting
- Historically under-resourced (Black, Indigenous students of color, economically disadvantaged, etc)
- Feeling unsafe in traditional settings because of LGBTQ+ status
- Behind in credits, wanting to accelerate, gifted
- Wanting to connect to post-secondary education and training, the trades, the military



#### **Students in Alternative Settings by Race**

#### The Road to Alternative Education

| Student meets with counselor and either requests             |

| alternative placement or is recommended for alternative      |
| placement  |
| District assesses whether all supports have been utilized in |
| resident school (MTSS and Tier 3 supports)                   |
| Referral to connections coordinator (not all school          |
| districts have someone in this role)                         |
| Placement in public or private alternative option            |
| Connection may occur with student who is currently           |
| attending or out of school                                   |
| If placement does not stick, the connections coordinator     |
| tries again  |
