
SENATE BILL 42 JANUARY 24, 2019

- Columbia Harvest Reform Policy late-2012; similar policies adopted by Oregon and Washington
- OFW Commission authority from legislature for fee to implement Columbia River Fisheries Reform policy (SB 830; ORS 508.980)
 - ► Legislature also appropriated General Funds
- Fee enacted in 2014 calendar year.
- \$9.75 annual, \$1 daily, included free with Youth License
- Required to angle for salmon, steelhead and sturgeon in Columbia Basin

Activities Supported

- Improved commercial and recreational fishery monitoring
- Enhanced hatchery production in off-channel areas
- Improved white sturgeon stock assessments
- Increased enforcement










2017-2019 biennium and beyond:

- Reduced focus on research; increased focus on implementation
- Increased off-channel production required by OFW Commission (adaptive management actions)
- Continue necessary monitoring (commercial and recreational)
- Continue added enforcement (OSP)
- Continue creel surveys above Bonneville
- Provide adequate assessment of white sturgeon
- 2018 funding support for Leaburg Hatchery

Columbia River Enhancement Fund



Benefits

- Increased hatchery production for off-channel commercial fisheries allowed increased salmon allocations for Columbia River anglers
- Improved stock assessments for white sturgeon necessary for sustainable management and re-initiation of harvest opportunities following closure
- Improved catch estimates and assessment of ESA impacts in upriver recreational fisheries to ensure accurate estimates of catch and ESA compliance
- Better enforcement
- Support for production of trout and additional Chinook salmon at Leaburg Hatchery

Consequences of Sunset

- Inability to continue enhanced off-channel hatchery production necessary to meet CR Reform policy objectives
 - Allowed for allocation shifts to recreational fisheries and removal of mainstem gillnets in spring and summer
- Reduced ability to monitor salmon and sturgeon populations and fisheries
- Reduced ability for enhanced enforcement
- Increased risk of non-concurrent regulations with WA if CR Reform objectives are not met






Percent Awarded by Project Type 07-17





2007-2017 R&E - \$22.1 Million


