Chair Greenlick and members of the committee,

Thank you for addressing this issue that prevents Oregon Medical Marijuana Patients from obtaining organ transplants. I serve on the Board of Directors for Compassionate Oregon and for OR NORML (the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws). Members in both organizations are vulnerable if a doctor recommends cannabis in the event that they need an organ transplant. Patients should be able to obtain a transplant if they are using doctor recommended medicine.

Much research exists to support the argument that cannabis can help <u>over a dozen ailments</u> without <u>harming a person's liver</u> like many other medications are known to do. The late great Oregon activist, Jim Klahr was forced to abstain from using medical cannabis because he was awaiting a transplant. Sadly he passed away within a week of his transplant surgery. I wonder if he would still be alive today if he was able to use medical cannabis during the years he was awaiting the transplant.

I would go further to argue that all Oregonians should be able to receive a transplant even if they use cannabis without a medical cannabis recommendation because our citizens would not be violating Oregon laws. However we should start by passing this bill and we can address this problem later.
