HB 2084 – Extends Sunset Date for Place-Based Planning – Support Re:

The League of Women Voters has had positions on water policy and planning since 1977. In 2011, after three years of study, we updated and combined our water policy positions on quality and quantity in recognition of their intrinsic connection. The League was proud to have participated in the development of the Integrated Water Resources Strategy (IWRS) in both 2012 and the update in 2017.

With those actions in mind, we strongly support the passage of HB 2084 to extend the sunset on this program until 2023. Frankly, we have been so impressed by the four local planning efforts that we would support removing the sunset entirely. It was clear from our work on the IWRS that broad-based local efforts will be the most successful mechanisms for addressing both water quality and quantity in Oregon. Each basin has its own special challenges and opportunities. Local planning is the best use of grant funds and of staff time and support.

We know of many other locations where additional funding for this program would be appreciated. You will hear from those who have been a part of the current planning efforts. It's hard work. But you will also hear that, if the outcomes from these efforts come to fruition, it will have been worth it, not only for those local areas, but for our entire state.

We urge you to unanimously provide a "do pass" recommendation on HB 2084. Thank you for

the opportunity to discuss this legislation.

From the January 28th Water Conditions Report: "The most recent update to the US Drought Monitor is showing an improvement in conditions in Oregon over the past few weeks. Indicators now to point toward D3 (Extreme Drought) in a little over 12 percent of the state. This is down from the 23 percent indicated last week. The report continues to show that 78 percent of the state is in D2 (Severe Drought), 91 percent is listed as in D1 (Moderate Drought) and 100 percent of the state is still listed as D0 (Abnormally Dry)."
