 - > Provides protection for vulnerable Oregonians


Long-Term Care Ombudsman Agency Overview

Long-Term Care Ombudsman Expenditure History + 2019-21 Governor's Budget



Other Funds

- > \$0.6 million (8 percent of revenue)
- All transferred from the Department of Human Services
 - Senior Medicare Patrol Grant Fund
 - Older Americans Act funds
 - Quality Care Fund

Governor's Budget

- Invested in personal service resources to grow the volunteer base for both ombudsman programs and provide sufficient salaries in the Oregon Public Guardian program
- Provided sufficient funding for Information Services contract to free up money for volunteer activities
- Adjustments to account for decline in the Senior Medicare Patrol funds from the Dept. of Human Services
- Statewide adjustments: updates to the Dept. of Administrative Services Price List and State Government Services Charges
