

Members of the House Education Committee:

I am writing to ask you to please support the “Too Young to Test” bill (HB 2318).

I am a retired teacher with 32 years experience. For 20 years I was a Title I Reading Specialist, working with 1st – 5th grades struggling to learn how to read. Then for 12 years I had the opportunity to design and coordinate the English Language Development Program in my district, as a Teacher on Special Assignment.

I am also a parent and now a grandparent, with a granddaughter in kindergarten and one entering school soon. I help in her class of 29 students two hours every week.

In all of these capacities, I know from experience that children learn at different rates. Teachers monitor their students’ progress daily, adjusting instruction and providing extra assistance as needed. They do curriculum-based assessments of students’ skills often. They share the information gained from monitoring and assessments with parents, so that home and school can work together to help the children learn.

Young children do not need to take standardized tests: these provide no useful data in comparison with the in-classroom, daily monitoring and curriculum-based assessments. Standardized tests also are extremely stressful for children, and take time away from classroom instruction.

For these reasons, please support the “Too Young to Test” bill (HB 2318).
