The EITC is a common sense tax credit for working families

- Encourages and rewards employment: you must work to earn the credit
- Recognizes that many jobs don't pay enough to meet basic necessities
- Boosts income for 900,000 Oregonians:
 one in every five
- Bipartisan support
- No "benefit cliff."



Oregon's EITC

- 6% match of Federal (1997)
- Made refundable (2007)
- Raised to 8% (2013)
- Boost for households with kids under 3 to 11% (2016)
- Opportunity to raise in 2019
 - HB 2139 (with -1 Amdt.)/HB 3028
 20%

Value of Federal Earned Income Tax Credit, 2018




