My name is Abigail Davidson and I am a mother of two boys aged 4yrs and 20 months. Both are vaccine free and have barely had a cold their entire lives. I attended one of the top private schools in Oregon from K-12. I am a native Oregonian, a wife to a firefighter/EMT as well as a daughter to a doctor, so am not lacking in medical knowledge or studies.

I know I am not alone in opposition of HB 3063 and would like to voice some concerns. We do not believe children should be excluded from their right to an education because of religious or philosophical reasons to not vaccinate. Vaccines should remain a choice for parents to make based on their research for their children. I have many friends and family who have had children with vaccine injuries, which started our deep research.
