Dear Oregon Legislators,

My name is Amber Christensen, and I live in Grants Pass Oregon. I oppose HB3063 and ask that you will oppose as well. Here is why...

I know the main goal in passing this bill is to protect those who are vulnerable in our community. However, this bill strips away the right to public education for another group of children who are vulnerable to vaccine injury.

A 3 year long Harvard study proved that only 1-10% of vaccine injuries are actually being reported to the current reporting system.

When looking at the numbers, this means that anywhere between 30,000 to 450,000 people are having serious adverse reactions from these recommended vaccinations each year that are not being reported. That is a massive amount of injury going unrecognized.

Our government agencies are not conducting research to find out why so many children are having these serious negative reactions. This needs to happen so that we can give proper medical exemptions to those who need them.
