I am writing in opposition to HB3063. I am a concerned mother of strong religious conviction. I cannot in good conscience follow the recommended vaccine schedule for myself or my children. The Supreme Court has interpreted religion to mean a sincere and meaningful belief that occupies in the life of its possessor a place parallel to the place held by God in the lives of other persons. Under this bill, my children would be discriminated against because of our family's religious beliefs.
