Dear Oregon Legislature,

I vehemently oppose HB 3063 for multiple reasons:

- 1) In 2001, my eldest son developed seizures and a documented auto immune disorder following his twelve-month vaccinations. The reaction happened immediately, and thus, we filed a claim with the federal Vaccine Injury Program. Since that time, my son has experienced on-going medical challenges, including epilepsy and chronic health problems.
- 2) I believe that medical decisions are to be made by the people who know their children the most: Their parents. Government should not interfere with a “one size fits all” law when the law does not consider individual or family medical histories.
- 3) There have been no studies to date that document the long-term safety of vaccines. Today’s vaccines contain aluminum in addition to other dangerous preservatives.

I recognize that there has been a recent measles “outbreak” in Clark County (Washington)—with 60 people impacted. However, the Vaccine Injury Compensation Program reports the following:

As of November 30, 2018, there have been more than [93,179](#) reports of measles vaccine reactions, hospitalizations, injuries and deaths following measles vaccinations made to the federal Vaccine Adverse Events Reporting System (VAERS), including [459](#) related deaths, [6,936](#) hospitalizations, and [1,748](#) related disabilities. [Over 50%](#) of those adverse events occurred in children three years old and under. However, the numbers of vaccine-related injuries and deaths reported to VAERS may not reflect the **true** number of serious health problems that occur develop after MMR vaccination.

Thus, I urge you to vote NO on HB 3063!
