My name is Samantha Togstad. I am a concerned parent who is hoping you consider a no vote for HB 3063. I myself have had adverse reactions listed in an insert. I am the mother of a child who has experienced negative side effects from certain vaccines. Side effects that are not enough to warrant a medial exemption but enough that it has effected her quality of life for many months. Now, even with these side effects I have continued to vaccinate her. On a slower pace. I am however choosing (at this time) to wait to give her Hep. B until she is older. Hepatitis B is not passed at school. And I have found studies that show that waiting until they are older will give the most protection. When she will really need it . When she will have an actual risk of contracting it. From Technical Viral Hepatitis Prevention Board Meeting in Milan, Italy: " Peak anti-B level depend mainly on age at vaccination, vaccine dosage and genetic factors... after 20 years only about 20-30% of individuals vaccinated as newborns are still anti-HBS positive with values > 10 IU/I. "
