Dear Members of the Committee:

I'm writing to express my personal opposition to HB 3063, as a future mother. This legislation is simply unconstitutional.

Our bloated vaccine schedule includes Hepatitis B vaccine given at birth, even though Hepatitis B is only transmissible via sexual contact or sharing needles. According to Paul Thomas, MD (<u>The Vaccine Friendly Plan</u>) also has extremely high aluminum content that is unsafe for babies on a microgram per pound of body weight level.
