Introduction:

Testimony:

The specter is real. Global population migrations, driven by loss of habitable/arable land due to climate driven inundation by rising ocean levels, loom. Other serious manifestations of changing global climate are poised to rearrange and challenge humanity's ability to thrive on this earth. Big problems are best addressed from the top down. Our world of diverse cultures and needs has come together to commit to a global solution. *Unfortunately our own country has abdicated its leadership in that effort.* In the absence of a coordinated national approach to carbon emissions reduction, Oregon needs to claim its place as a leader in the same way it did in the days of Tom McCall when "fishable, swimmable waters" was the goal.
