The people who manage and work in our forests and their families rely on the same clean drinking water supplied to the communities where they live. Clearcutting and application of herbicides and fertilizers are common practices that are being applied effectively and safely. To prohibit these practices would essentially shut down timber production in our State along with the many benefits provided by managed forests. HB 2656 is completely unnecessary in that it would not provide any additional benefits our drinking water sources while at the same time destroying a vital piece of Oregon's economy.
