Oregon Housing and Community Service Agency Overview




• Emerging issues:

- > Increase in homelessness across the state
 - Need to address long term and short term housing needs.
 - Need to address economic homelessness and chronic homelessness.


Oregon Housing and Community Services Expenditure History + 2019-21 Governor's Budget








Agency Budget by Expenditure Category (\$1,976.3 Millions All Funds)

- Ending Children's Homelessness
 - LIFT funding for affordable housing
 - Permanent funding for Emergency Housing Account/State Homeless Assistance Program
 - > Addressing child homelessness
 - Resources for tenants and landlords
 - > Preservation of affordable housing
 - Funding the acquisition of naturally occurring affordable housing
 - Maintaining the Individual Development Account program



- Housing Oregon's Veterans
 - Homeless assistance, affordable rental housing, home purchase, Housing Integrator
- Building Permanent Supportive Housing
 - \$50 million in bonding collaboration with OHA for rental assistance and service delivery
- Accelerating the Growth of Housing Supply
 - > Greater Oregon Housing Accelerator
 - Modification of the Housing Development
 Guarantee Account



- Investments in staff resources
 - Increased administrative staff (24.00 FTE)
 - Increased program staff (35.50 FTE)
 - Re-established limited duration staff for the federal Homeownership Stabilization Initiative (17.25 FTE)



Other Issues

- One of the challenges facing Oregon's housing providers is external capacity. OHCS is working to attract and develop more people and businesses to build, and preserve new housing
- Potential issue with the resources needed and onboarding of new staff

Statewide adjustments

> Updates to the Department of Administrative Services Price List and State Government Services Charges and Attorney General Costs.



- Governor's Budget contains \$50 million of Article Q bonds for Permanent Supportive Housing. The bond proceeds were coded incorrectly and should be changed to Other Funds Capital Construction.
 - This investment is coupled with \$4.5 million in General Fund in the OHA budget
