

CAMPUS SECURITY TIMELINE



2015

•COCC security agrees to turn over narcotics they have unlawfully seizing and storing.

- •A cell phone is found hidden in the women's bathroom, later determined to have been live broadcasting. COCC returns phone to suspect.
- •COCC announces their legal team has defined them as a law enforcement agency.
- •*Mark Alan Mahoney begins stalking young female students in the campus library, stealing their clothing for sexual gratification and as trophies. COCC takes reports and begins their own investigations and surveillance operations without notifying Bend PD.

2016

•COCC security announces it has jurisdiction to enforce most federal, state, county laws and city ordinances on campus and adjacent streets and roadways.

- •Kaylee Sawyer is kidnapped by a COCC security officer on campus. He uses the COCC issued police equipment to restrain her.
- •Aundrea Mayes is kidnapped in Salem using the same COCC issued police equipment and transported to California by the same COCC security guard.

2017


- •An MOU is signed between the City of Bend and COCC, in which COCC agrees to stop conducting criminal investigations, to call Bend PD when crimes occur, and to provide Bend PD with copies of reports they take.
- •*Mark Alan Mahoney is arrested by the Bend Police after a victim reports her coat stolen at COCC directly to Bend Police. Bend Detectives arrest Mahoney within two hours, ending his serial stalking. It is determined Mahoney has stalked and stolen from between 8-11 female students on the COCC Campus to fulfil his fantasies.


2018

- •A review by the Bend PD crime analyst using open sources determines COCC security has underreported crimes occurring on campus by up to 75% in the 12-month period following the signing of the MOU and, in turn, continued to conduct criminal investigations and file reports only in their office.
- •A female student reports being attacked in the parking lot next to where Kaylee Sawyer was murdered to COCC security who then conduct a full investigation but do not call Bend PD or forward their reports.
- •COCC Security unlawfully stops, detains and questions a civilian, believing he is a suspect in an attack near the parking lot on Campus.
- •A series of five unlawful entries into motor vehicles occurs on COCC campus. Campus security responds, takes reports, investigates the crimes but does not notify the Bend Police.



CHALLENGES AND SOLUTIONS



Present Challenges

- Police tax dollars spent fighting college tax dollars to protect citizens rights.
- Crimes going unsolved.
- Stolen property not being recovered.
- Abuse of "stop and frisk" authority.
- Violation of victim's Oregon Constitutional rights.
- Expanded interpretation of ORS 341.300.
- Use of ORS 133.225: Private Person Arrest by public employees.
- No clear standards as a result of the blurring between:
 - University Police
 - Special campus security
 - · General security officers.
- Students and Citizens unable to differentiate between campus security and police officers.
- COCC's positions is "no statute says we can't operate like police."
- COCC's position is "no statute requires us to turn over the crime reports we take."

Projected outcomes of Kaylee's law

- Reduces the ability for rogue campus security units to operate in the margins of the current statutes.
- Eliminates the abuse of the stop and frisk
- Safer campuses.
- Clarifies roles and responsibilities of campus security units.
- Standardize and professionalizes campus security programs.
- Reduces the confusion between campus security and police officers.
- Establishes a path to ensuring citizen and victim's rights.
- Has potential of reducing wasted tax dollars on litigation.
