



2019-2021 Budget Overview









Budget Drivers

- Increased revenue to the Common School Fund
- Stewardship of Common School Fund assets, waterways and wetlands, and unclaimed property & estates
- Improved customer engagement and public service;
 streamlined service delivery; increased public outreach



Budget Risks

- Portland Harbor Superfund site cleanup
- Uncertainty related to other waterway cleanups
- Legal challenges related to agency decisions and management of lands
- Increased demand for services due to economic upturn and other factors



Environmental Factors

- Listed species on DSL lands
- Drought impacts on DSL lands
- Wildfire risks on DSL lands
- Increased public use of state-managed waterways and lands



Agency Changes

- 2014: Agency reorganization; established regional teams; grouped programs for better customer service; achieved reduced manager to staff ratios
- 2017: New 2017-21 Strategic Plan adopted, with updated goals and objectives
- 2018: New Customer Engagement Guidelines implemented




Containing Costs & Improving Service

- Cost containment as a key component of Common School Fund stewardship
- Extensive business process improvements, including online permitting and reporting and more efficient administrative processes
- Streamlined wetland and waterway permitting processes
- Alternative management options, revenue sources for South Slough

Proposed Legislation Affecting Agency

- **HB 2436:** Adds Natural Resource Specialist positions to support exploration of a single, state-led process for obtaining state and federal wetland and water permits (404 assumption)
- HB 2438: Adds Natural Resource Specialist position to support review of Wetland Land Use Notices
- **SB 454:** Transfers Unclaimed Property Program from DSL to Oregon State Treasury
