TESTIMONY TO THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND LABOR By Maria Delgado

Chair Baker, Taylor and members of the committee,

My name is Maria Delgado. Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of HB 3031 that would create a paid family medical leave program in Oregon.

I am originally from Mexico City, and I immigrated to the United States, in search of the American Dream in 1991. In 1998, I gave birth to my first son in California. While my employer at the time, allowed for one month of leave, I was forced to permanently leave work because a month was not enough to care for my new born baby, who developed serious health conditions.

In 2006, I moved to Oregon. As a single mother of two, and without knowledge about resources or connections to community or family, I worked hard to find a job. Through the years, I found work in various canneries in Oregon. Many of these canneries did not allow workers to take enough time away from work while sick. On many occasions, I had to work with severe flu symptoms.

In 2009, I was diagnosed with skin cancer. I had to undergo treatment and a major surgery that kept me away from work. I was forced to leave my job, I was told that after missing a few days, the employer would have to hire someone to replace me. I did not know this large company of more than 200 workers, they had to provide 12 unpaid weeks of Paid Family Medical Leave. I did not know my worker rights, and like many other people I lived in constant fear.

Given my family's situation, my son began to suffer from emotional health issues. As a single parent, recovering from a severe health condition, I found it difficult to find employment. I had to live on government assistance, with about 500 dollars a month to survive. I never could focus on achieving stability with my family due to the instability of my work place. It hurts me to know that I had rights that I did not know of, which could have lessened the impact on my kids during these difficult times.

That is why today I fully support HB 3031, which would establish a paid family medical leave program so that our workers can take care of their families, especially our most vulnerable workers.

Today, as a mother, a worker, and a member of our community, I ask for your support for HB 3031.
