With new amendments being posted to HB 3063 please consider the following opposing comments to my original testimony submitted by March 1st.

- 1. I support an ammendement with further education (as in the video I watch today) and if further discussions with my doctor is needed, that is appropriate. And if documentation is needed to enter school that a parent took the time to discuss and become more informed, that seems like a respectable compromise. This is between me and my doctor. I would also like to see a mandate that Doctors are educated (on both sides) with more information as well.
- 3. A voucher for private school does not solve any problems but looks like a political stunt. Discrimination still persists and my children are still allowed to be in public parks, camps, etc and even schools since homeschooled children still attend schools for music and PE classes as well as joining their local school district sports teams.
- 4. The bill is not specifying what vaccines a child would have to have and over what course of time to be considered "caught up".
- 5. Medical exemption are impossible (even for children with severe egg allergies and eggs are in vaccines). This definition needs to be broadened and Doctors not fearful of loosing their license if they write an exemption.

Also, has it been considered that Oregon has had a boom because of people moving from California who did not want to vaccinate their children? The statistics show the growth and this mandate could cause economic downturn. I hope with your further discussions today you are looking at a broader picture at how complex of an issue this is, the politics behind it and how parents questioning vaccines are well informed. My last thought is how can you mandate any drug that VAERS has paid out over \$4billion dollars (including your tax dollars) due to injury?
