Support Senate Bill 1035

On behalf of the Campaign for Seniors and People with Disabilities, we would like to offer our full support for SB 1035, a bill that will provide a pathway to finding resources for critical respite services to assist family caregivers in Oregon.

According to a 2016 report from the Oregon Caregiver Respite Work Group, nearly 470,000 family caregivers provide 437 million hours of unpaid care each year. Not only does this care help maintain individuals in their homes and homes of their loved ones, but this care is valued at an estimated \$5.7 billion annually. However, caregiving is a difficult and often stressful task. Without proper supports, caregivers are likely to burnout or have negative impacts on their own well-being.

In order for these family caregivers to be successful in the long-run, they need adequate supports including respite care. Respite care would allow caregivers to take a break – go grocery shopping, visit with friends, or simply rest and recuperate.

SB 1035 requires OHA and DHS to convene a stakeholder group to advise on the creation of a Medicaid waiver that would be submitted to CMS asking for our general fund dollars to be matched with federal Medicaid dollars in support of respite services. This is not a new idea as both Minnesota and Washington have Medicaid waivers that allow for support of respite services. As a leader in long term care services and supports, Oregon should join these two states in this critical support for family caregivers.
