I am a concerned citizen, residing in Forest Grove, OR and I'm writing about SB 978. My interest as a progressive voter, and one who is pragmatic on the issues, is to approach the gun issue in a thoughtful and practical way.

I am concerned with the safety of our students in schools and this includes my own two children. I cannot help but notice that it was only in the last few months that any visible signs of security has been implemented in my own school district, consisting of a camera door-bell at the school front-door. I have, silently, been rather shocked that no more observable measures have been implemented. What we have today still seems remarkably bereft of what I would call 'comprehensive security.'

I use this example of inattention to the security of our children in schools to draw a stark contrast to the attention and efforts that have been underway to curb gun ownership and outlaw whole categories of firearms.

I think that it is wrong to widen the divide even further by stoking anger that this legislation will surely foster.

Being a progressive, yet pragmatic voter, I feel that the legislation is rather draconian. In fact, it may change the way I vote. I would like my statements to have an impact and hope you understand that we need to come together and not further divide each other.
