

**SB 1030 STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY**

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**WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:**

Establishes legislative intent that expenditures of the Oregon Health Authority and coordinated care organizations (CCOs) in the medical assistance program and the manner in which OHA establishes global budgets be fully transparent and available to the public. Requires OHA to make publicly available specified information about payments to and expenditures by coordinated care organizations (CCOs), OHA, and the Department of Human Services. Requires OHA to make readily available and report annually to the Legislative Assembly CCO compensation, financial disbursements, audited financial statements, and tax information. Requires OHA to adopt by rule uniform data reporting requirements for COOs. Requires OHA to create a public annual per capita cost report by CCO beginning January 1, 2020. Sunsets requirement that OHA reporting include hospital payments on January 2, 2031. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

**BACKGROUND:**

With the passage of House Bill 3650 (2011) and Senate Bill 1580 (2012), the Legislative Assembly established the Oregon Integrated and Coordinated Health Care Delivery System in which newly established coordinated care organizations (CCOs) became responsible for coordinating the physical, behavioral, and oral health care for individuals enrolled in the state's Medicaid program, the Oregon Health Plan (OHP). Fifteen regional CCOs currently coordinate the provision of services for over 850,000 Oregonians enrolled in OHP.

Senate Bill 1030 requires OHA to make publicly available specified financial information about the administration of the Oregon Integrated and Coordinated Health Care Delivery System.
