Co-Chairs Fredrick and McLain,

Thank you for the opportunity to answer questions that arose during the April 1, 2019 presentation.

**Co-Chair McLain** had asked for clarification regarding the number of state programs. Oregon Public Universities administer, including programs funded with one-time funding, is nineteen (19). On a continual basis, the Oregon Public Universities administer the following fourteen (14) programs:

**Representative Meek** had asked about the involvement of our Statewide Public Service programs and the Oregon State University Extension Service with school lunch and Farm to School programs.

The Oregon State University Extension Service is an integral partner as part of the comprehensive Oregon Farm to School bill in the upcoming legislative session for the next biennium. Funds from this bill will leverage the resources, expertise, and staff of OSU Extension as a key partner to ensure the statewide capacity-building for the implementation of Oregon Farm to School, and therefore the long-term educational and economic impact of the legislative investment in Oregon Farm to School. Oregon is home to many successful local and statewide farm to school initiatives. The state is fortunate to have a strong team working to further the farm to school mission including the Oregon Department of Education (NFSN Core Partner), Oregon Farm to School and School Garden Network (NFSN Supporting Partner), and the Oregon Department of Agriculture (NFSN Supporting Partner), and other amazing partners who provide statewide leadership. OSU Extension is a key partner in this leadership team. The full OFSSGN consists of over 900 members which includes school districts, non-profit organizations, local farmers and more.

OSU currently supports this network of educators, government agencies, non-profit organizations, and farmers with:

- Training: Draw on existing OSU expertise and collaborate with OFSSGN partners to facilitate trainings for schools, farmers, producers, Food Corps members and community partners across Oregon. To support these efforts OSU Extension draws on the expertise and adaptation of existing Extension trainings, outreach programs, and curriculum. These trainings include, but are not limited to Junior Master Gardeners, Seed to Supper, Master Gardeners, Small Farms training, Youth Entrepreneurs and SNAP Ed and 4-H Garden clubs.
- 2. Research Connections: OSU Extension connects schools, farmers/producers, and community partners to relevant and contemporary research in topics including agricultural

science, education, positive youth development, nutrition, food safety, and best practices related to farm to school and school gardens for farm to school

- 3. Regional Hubs: OSU Extension engages and support regional hubs to facilitate trainings, networking, provide technical assistance and relevant research and resources. OSU is the lead on two of the 8 hubs.
- 4. Online Support: Develop and maintain web-based resources and serve as a clearing house for relevant research and resources developed by OSU, and curated research and resources from other organizations and institutions across the state and nation.

**Co-Chair Fredrick and Representative Drazan** asked for more information regarding the Sports Lottery program, which supports athletics at each university. Specifically, Co-Chair Fredrick had asked for demographic information and graduation rates of student athletes, and Representative Drazan asked about the average scholarship awards by gender.

In regard to the demographics of student athletes, some of the methods of tracking are different between the campuses. All institutions reported on the contribution to diversity of each sporting team, and most were able to provide demographic breakdown of all student athletes.

It is also important to note that institutions provide more scholarship funding than the total Sports Lottery funding received on campus.

#### INFORMATION ABOUT THE GRADUATION RATES INSTITUTION REPORT

#### Introduction.

This information sheet and the NCAA Graduation Rates Institution Report have been prepared by the NCAA, based on data provided by the institution in compliance with NCAA Bylaw 18.4.2.2.1 (admissions and graduation-rate disclosure) and the federal Student Right-to-Know. Please note, the NCAA will make this report public.

The Graduation Rates Institution Report gives graduation information about the most recent sixyear graduating class of students and student-athletes who entered as freshmen in 2011-12. The graduation rate (percent) is based on a comparison of the number (N) of students who entered a college or university and the number of those who graduated within six years. For example, if 100 students entered and 60 graduated within six years, the graduation rate is 60 percent.

The Graduation Rates Institution Report provides information about two groups of students:

- 1. <u>All Students</u>. All undergraduate students who were enrolled in a full-time program of studies for a baccalaureate degree; and
- 2. <u>Student-Athletes</u>. Student-athletes who received athletics aid from the school for any period of time during their entering year. [Note: Athletics aid is a grant, scholarship, tuition waiver or other assistance from a college or university that is awarded on the basis of a student's athletics ability.]

Two different measures of graduation rates are presented in this report: Federal Graduation Rate and NCAA Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR). The Federal Graduation Rate indicates the percentage of freshmen who entered and received athletics aid during a given academic year who graduated within six years. The GSR adds to the first-time freshmen, those students who entered midyear as well as student-athletes who transferred into an institution and received athletics aid. Both the Federal Graduation Rate and the GSR subtract students from the entering cohort who are considered allowable exclusions (i.e., those who either die or become permanently disabled, those who leave the school to join the armed forces, foreign services or attend a religious mission). In addition, the GSR subtracts those who left the institution prior to graduation, had athletics eligibility remaining and would have been academically eligible to compete had they returned to the institution.

#### **Graduation Rates Report.**

The box at the top of the Graduation Rates Institution Report provides the most recent class (i.e., 2012-13) and four-class Federal Graduation Rate (i.e., 2009-10 through 2012-13) for all students and for student-athletes who received athletics aid at this school. Additionally, this box provides GSR data (i.e., 2009-10 through 2012-13) for student-athletes.

- 1. <u>Graduation-Rates Data</u>. The second section of the report provides Federal\_Graduation Rate and GSR data for all students, student-athletes and student-athletes by sport group. (Note: Pursuant to the Student Right-to-Know Act, anytime a cell containing cohort numbers includes only one or two students, the data in that cell and one other will be suppressed so that no individual can be identified.)
  - a. All Students. This section provides the freshman-cohort graduation rates for all fulltime, degree-seeking students by race or ethnic group. It shows the rate for men who entered as freshmen in 2012-13 and the four-class average, which includes those who entered as freshmen in 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12 and 2012-13. The same rates are provided for women. The total for 2012-13 is the rate for men and women combined, and the four-class average is for all students who entered in 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12 and 2012-13.
  - b. Student-Athletes. This section provides the freshman-cohort graduation rates and the GSR for student-athletes in each race and ethnic group who received athletics aid. Information is provided for men and women separately and for all student-athletes.
  - c. Student-Athletes by Sports Categories. This section provides the identified graduation rates as in 1-b for each of the eight sports categories. (The small letters indicate the value of N according to the legend at the bottom of 1-c.)
- 2. <u>Undergraduate-Enrollment Data</u>.
  - a. All Students. This section indicates the total number of full-time, undergraduate, baccalaureate, degree-seeking students enrolled for the 2018 fall term and the number of men and women in each racial or ethnic group (not just freshmen).
  - b. Student-Athletes. This section identifies how many student-athletes were enrolled and received athletics aid for the 2018-19 academic year, and the number of men and women in each racial or ethnic group.
  - c. Student-Athletes by Sports Categories. This section provides the enrollment data as identified in 2-b for each of the eight sports categories.
