

To Chair Williamson, Vice Chair Gorsek and Sprenger, and Members of Committee on House Judiciary,

I am a resident of Oregon and supporter of human rights, which are also the right to safety of sex workers.

- Why is this Bill Important?

> Sex workers are some of the most vulnerable members of the community. Their line of work puts them in close contact with people from all backgrounds in often very vulnerable settings.

> Right now, sex workers cannot safely report when they get assaulted, attacked, injured by ANY client because they will likely get prosecuted by the police for prostitution or attempted prostitution.

> Which means they if are exposed to violence, they CURRENTLY CANNOT seek protection from law enforcement or even approaching emergency medical help.

> Passing this bill would allow the basic human right for a vulnerable community to seek the same minimum level of protection all people have in OR without backlash and fear of punishment.

- What does it remedy:

> This bill would allow sex workers to seek emergency services, including law-enforcement and medical care without fear of being prosecuted for prostitution or attempted prostitution.

> Passing this bill would allow the basic human right for a vulnerable community to seek the same minimum level of protection all people have in Oregon, without fear of backlash and further harm to their person or legal status.

- My position on this Bill is that I support it and I would like it to get passed.
