To Chair Williamson, Vice Chair Gorsek and Sprenger, and Members of Committee on House Judiciary,

I am a resident of Oregon and supporter of human rights which are also the right to safety for people who are sex workers.

Why is this Bill Important:

Sex workers are some of the most vulnerable members of the community. The line of work puts them in close contact with people from all backgrounds in often very vulnerable settings. Additionally, there is intense stigma against them which means they don't have large community support. Still, they are people and their safety is important.

Right now, sex workers cannot safely report when they get assaulted, attacked, injured by ANY client because they will likely get prosecuted by the police for prostitution or attempted prostitution. Which means that if they are exposed to violence, sex workers CURRENTLY CANNOT seek protection from law enforcement or even approaching emergency medical help.

Passing this bill would allow the basic human right for a vulnerable community to seek the same level minimum level of protection all people have in Oregon without backlash.

What does it remedy:

This bill would allow sex workers to seek emergency services, including law enforcement and medical care, without fear of being prosecuted for prostitution or attempted prostitution.

My position on this Bill is that I support it and I would like it to get passed. I support <u>SB596</u>.
