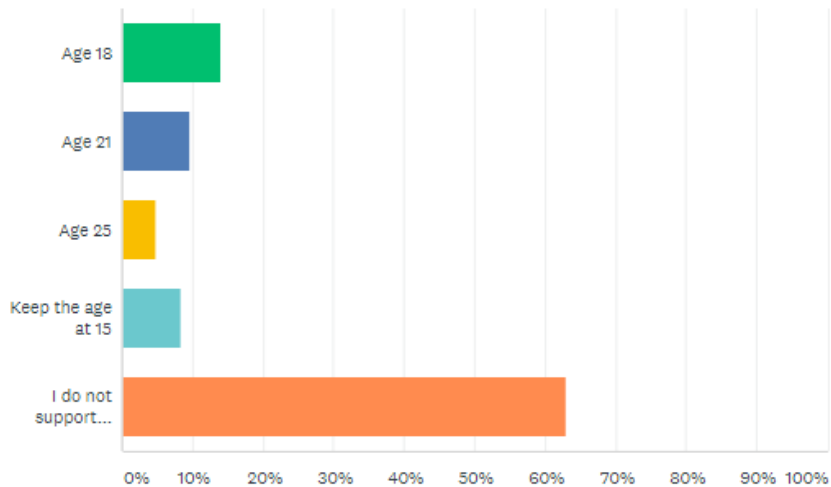


Oregon's Measure 11 Legislative Bill
Support Survey Results (8/1/18-12/6/18)

Question #1:

In Oregon, there are 21 different crimes that are considered Measure 11 offenses (https://www.oregon.gov/doc/resrch/Pages/measure_11.aspx). You can be convicted of a Measure 11 offense starting at the age of 15 and will serve a mandatory minimum sentence, meaning you will serve every day of your sentence. The least amount of time served under Measure 11 is 70 months (5 years, 10 months). I support changing the starting age of Measure 11 mandatory minimum sentencing in Oregon to:

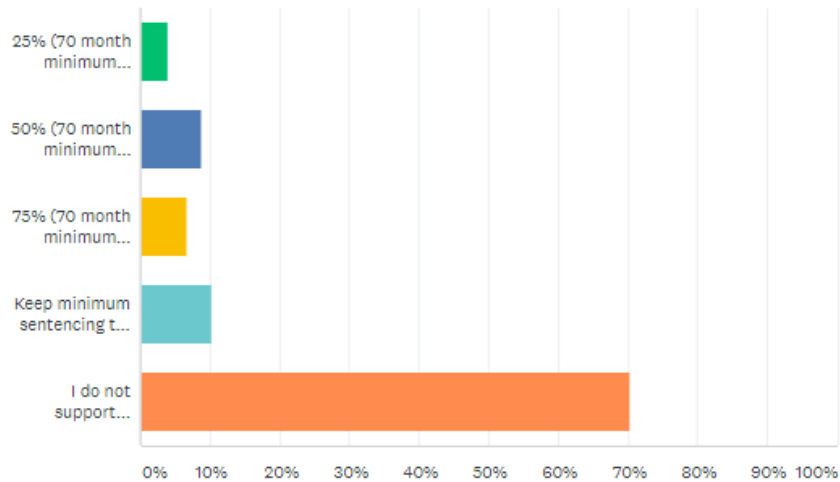

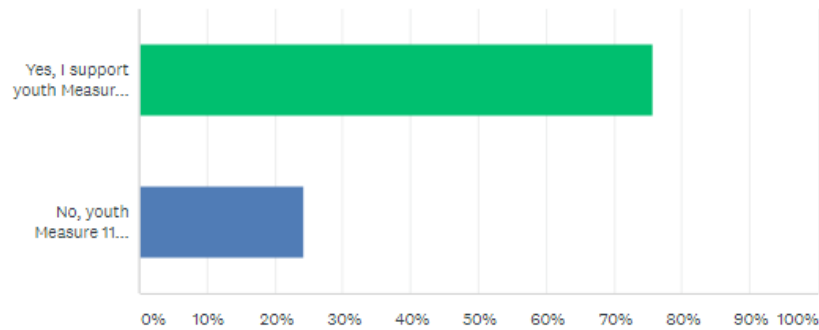

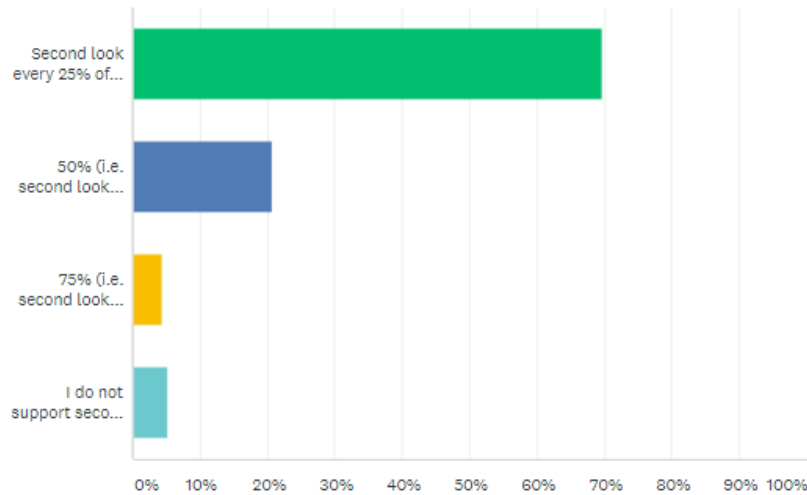

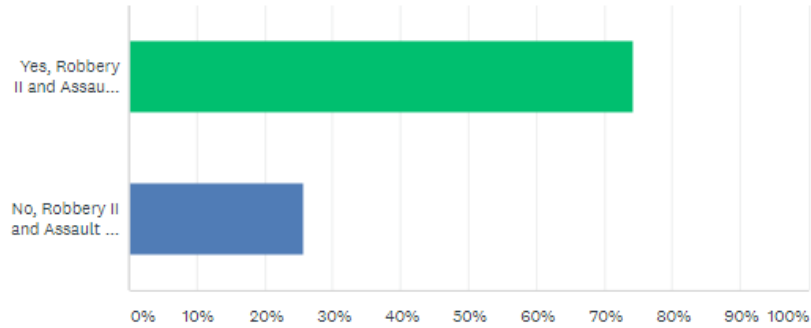

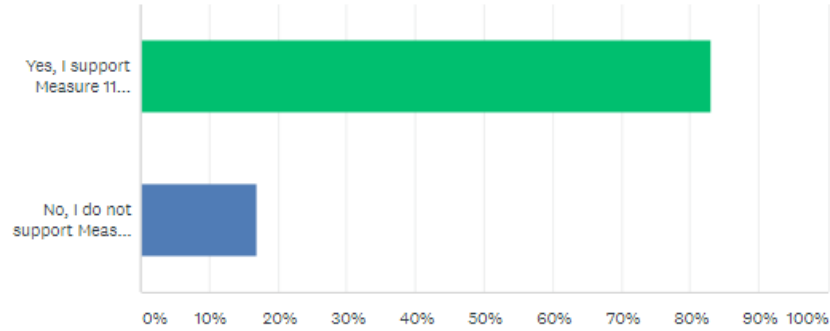

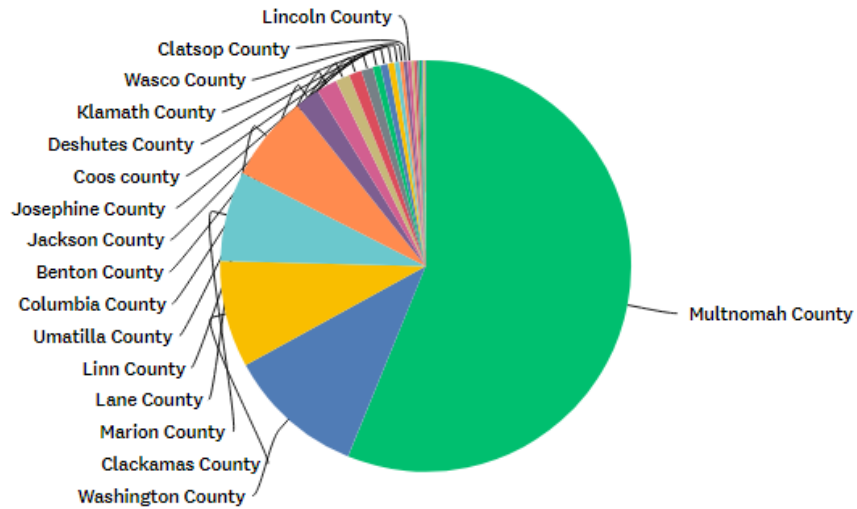

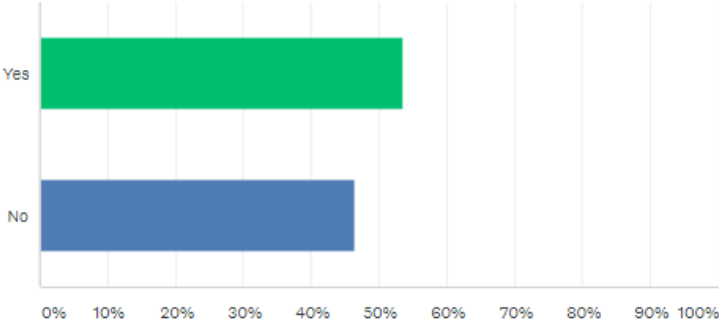

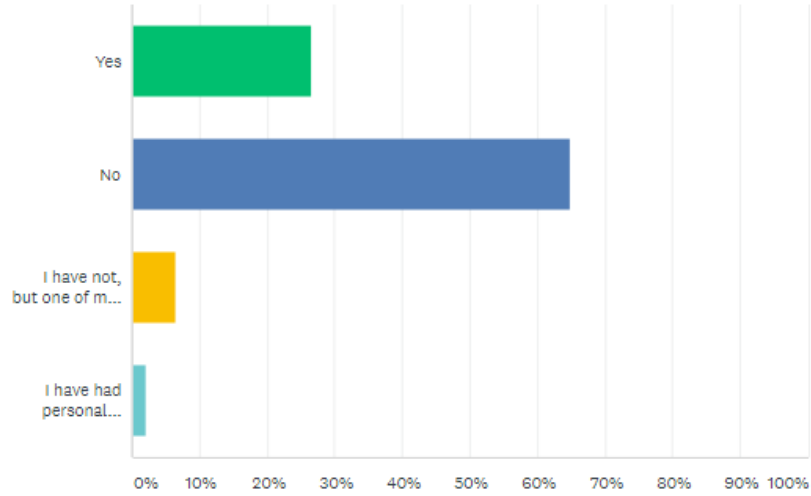

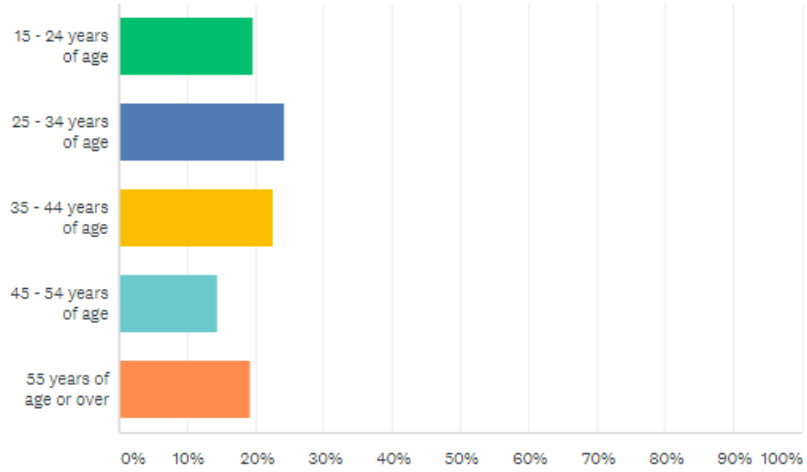

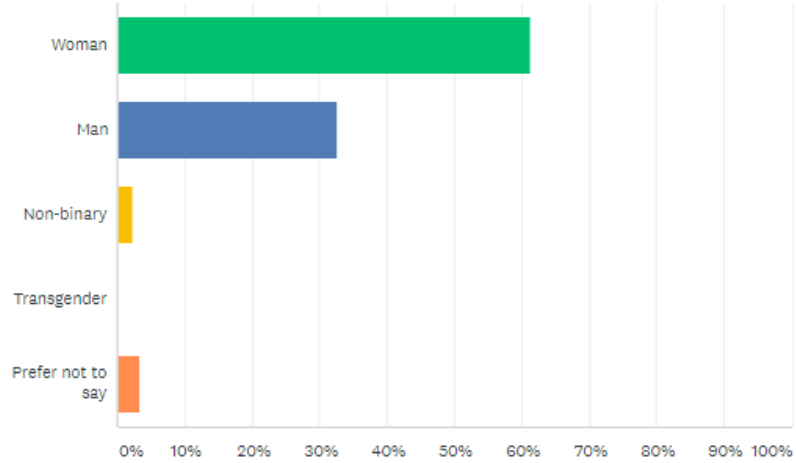

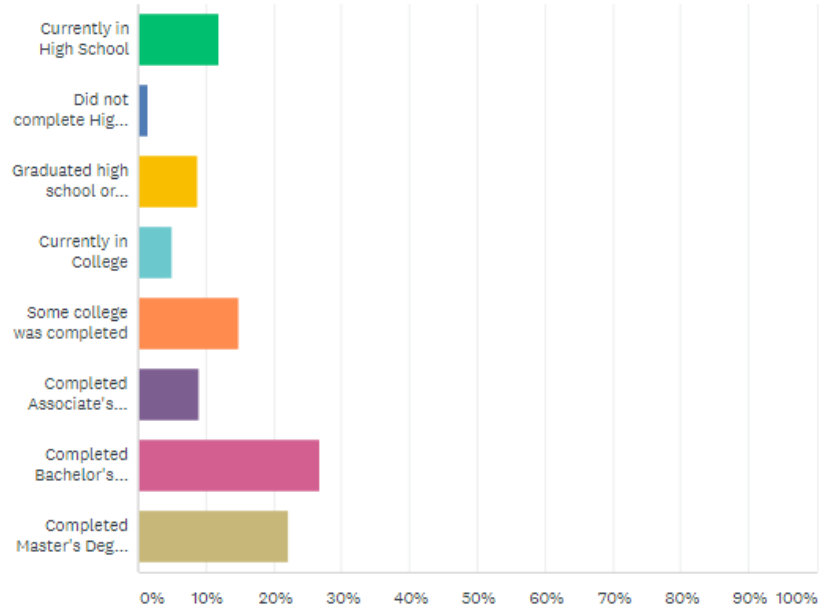

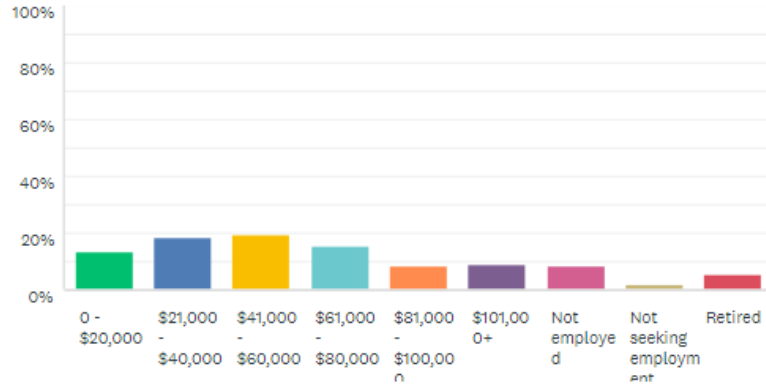

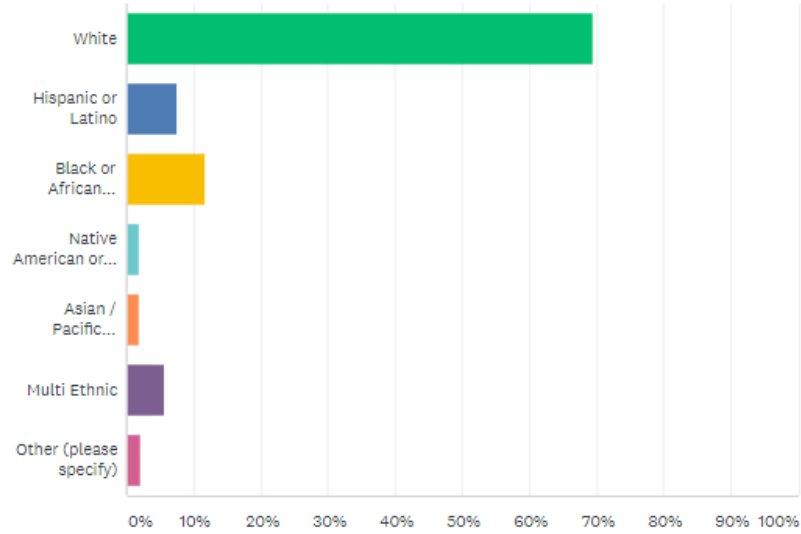
