Chairs Girod and Holvey, members of the committee, my name is Barry Nelson, and I'm co-chair for the committee to build the Gerry Frank | Salem Rotary Amphitheater, a community project led by Rotary in celebration of 100 years of Rotary service in the Willamette Valley. Salem Mayor Chuck Bennett and I are asking for your support of \$1.75 million toward this \$6.5 million public/private partnership.

We are supplying the committee with brochures which have additional information and a one-pager on OLIS outlining our request.

In selecting our centennial project, it was important to our club that the amphitheater is open to all in our community, from every socioeconomic and cultural background, the old and the young. The Gerry Frank | Salem Rotary Amphitheater will have no locked doors, will be a first class performance venue that provides cultural opportunities and economic vitality to Salem's adjacent downtown core, and when not in use for performance, it will serve as a gathering place in one of the largest urban parks in the country.

The amphitheater, while serving as a legacy of Rotary service, is also named in honor of Oregon's first and only Premier Citizen, Gerry Frank, for his more than 60 years of Rotary service and living a life according to Rotary's motto: Service Above Self. There probably isn't a single person in the state who hasn't been touched by Gerry's generosity and gracious service to his fellow Oregonians.


