I?m writing to urge you to pass the strongest possible version of the Clean Energy Jobs bill (House Bill 2020) in the 2019 Session. No other policy this session will do more to reduce climate pollution in Oregon and tackle humanity?s greatest problem. It?s taken years of work to get here and it is past time for bold action.

The cap-and-invest system set up by Clean Energy Jobs not only guarantees harmful pollution will be reduced, but it will also build up our economy and communities at the same time.

The program must ensure that offset benefits accrue to Oregon communities, do not contribute to pollution ?hotspots? in other states, and are only given for emissions reductions that would not have happened in the absence of the offset program.
