



### CHALLENGES WITH PRESENT AUTHORITY AND DANGEROUS PRACTICES OF HIGHER EDUCATION SAFETY UNITS



- There is no rule or law allowing for the removal of stop and frisk authority from campus safety officers
- Those suffering mental health crises are being locked into caged security vehicles
- Campus Security units are detaining individuals from between 1 and 4 hours.
- A lack of Statewide standardized practices by higher education safety units
- Crimes going unsolved and stolen property not being recovered.
- Violation of victim's rights.
- Abuse of "stop and frisk" authority.
- Expanded interpretation of ORS 341.300.
- Use of ORS 133.225: Private Person Arrest by public employees.

- No clear standards as a result of the blurring between:
  - University Police
  - Special campus security
  - General security officers.
- Students and Citizens are unable to differentiate between campus security and police officers.
- COCC's positions is "no statute says we can't operate like police."
- COCC's position is "no statute requires us to turn over the crime reports we take."
- Police tax dollars spent fighting college tax dollars to protect citizens rights.

# SOLUTIONS AND CLARITY PROVIDED BY KAYLEE'S LAW



- Will provide the tools need to insure unqualified individuals are not given police authority as campus safety officers.
- Provides clear guidance on who is and isn't a law enforcement agency and clarifies roles and responsibilities for higher education security units statewide
- Eliminates the abuse of the stop and frisk which led to Kaylee's death
- It will end stops and frisks which are not be captured and reported as required by Bill 2355
- It will end the practice by university safety units of detaining and transporting the mentally ill while locked in the rear of security vehicles with cages.
- Will take the campus safety units the next level of professionalism and standardize their operations State wide.
- Reduces the confusion between campus security and police officers by students
- Establishes a path to ensuring citizen and students rights as victims are honored.
- Has potential of reducing wasted tax dollars on litigation.
- Reduces the ability for rogue campus security units to operate in the margins of the current statutes.
- All Resulting in safer campuses.
