

## **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)**

■ Preventing hunger ■ Improving health ■ Providing education and training ■ Boosting local economies

Applicants who are ages 18-49, and are attending higher education at least half time, may be eligible for SNAP benefits if they meet additional special criteria. There are multiple ways a student can meet the criteria, just a few of the most common are:

- ► Be physically and mentally unable to work
- ► Be awarded Federal Work Study and working in a work study job
- ▶ Be working an average of 20 hours per week
- ▶ Be caring for a child in the household under the age of 6
- ► Be receiving disability benefits
- ► Enrolled in a CTE Program or course of study leading to employment\*

## Career and Technical Education (CTE)

An Oregon Career and Technical Education Program of Study is a sequence of CTE courses, aligned to industry standards at the secondary and post-secondary level that integrates technical and career skill proficiencies with academic content. CTE prepares students for the workplace, further education, training and community roles

## July 1, 2018 Oregon expanded SNAP eligibility to students enrolled in a Career and Technical Education Program
