Dear Co-Chair Frederick, Co-Chair McLane and members of the Joint Ways and Means Subcommittee on Education,

Testimony on HB 5016: the State School Fund.

Every Oregon high school student should have the opportunity to spend a high school year studying abroad paid for by the State of Oregon (or one of its local school districts) as a part of their public education programs. High school study abroad should not just be for the wealthy who can afford it.

Please ensure that State School Funds can be used by local school districts to pay for sending high school students to study abroad and that some state school funds are allocated to the Department of Education for a "Strategic Study Abroad Program" which the Department of Education can use to send high school students to study aboard in countries critical for Oregon's future like China.

Oregon could both improve student learning and save money by paying the fees for high school years abroad provided by existing study abroad organizations. Extending study abroad opportunities to all Oregon students does not require more revenues or more spending, just a shift in what the educational system spends money on. Instead of spending money for students located in high schools in Oregon, we could spend some money on our students in high schools abroad.

In 2016-17, Oregon public education spent \$12,520 per students, including \$11,127 in operating expenditures and \$1,363 in capital expenditures per student.

There are current study abroad organizations that offer high school years abroad for less than current per student per year expenditures in Oregon. ASSE, as one of these study abroad organizations, tends to have the lowest fees.

ASSE was established in 1976 as the American Scandinavian Student Exchange by the Swedish Government to organize student exchange programs between Sweden and the United States. It now maintains 38 offices in 31 countries and accommodates more than 30,000 high school age students and host families annually in its programs in the participating countries.

Program fees include: Round trip international airfare from New York to Europe and South Africa, from Miami to Brazil and Argentina, from Los Angeles to Asia/Pacific. Fees also include comprehensive health, accidental death and travel insurance, host family recruitment and screening, non-English speaking country language training, and orientation. Note that for 2019-20 ASSE offers high school years abroad for less than \$12,250 to twenty countries, as follows:
