Dear members of the JWMTR,

I am a homeowner in SE Portland, and I urge you to **support** House Bill 2001 **without** the -22 amendment. HB 2001 provides a unique and powerful opportunity to address multiple urgent issues: housing affordability, climate change, and transportation options and accessibility. By allowing middle housing in all urban residential areas, we can help many Oregonians find more affordable homes that are closer to jobs, shops, services, and (in many cases) their own families.

However, the -22 amendment would dramatically reduce the positive impacts of this bill, by reducing the likelihood of middle housing development in many areas. We do not need any form of exclusionary zoning in our cities -- and the -22 amendment would, in practice, exclude middle housing from affluent neighborhoods and others where the value of land is rising (areas that often provide the best access to jobs, shops, and services). This is the exact opposite of what we need.

Thank you for your consideration and your support. I welcome more homes, for more people, in all of our communities.
