## WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Extends statute of limitations for civil actions relating to sexual assault to seven years from the date the person discovers, or in the exercise of reasonable care should have discovered, the causal relationship between sexual assault and injury. Defines sexual assault as rape, sodomy, unlawful sexual penetration, incest, sexual abuse, and sexual exploitation. Applies to actions commenced on or after the effective date of Act, including any action that would be barred by current limitation period. Specifies that measure does not create new cause of action. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

#### **ISSUES DISCUSSED:**

- Long term effects of sexual assault may prevent victim from bringing suit within current two-year statute of limitations
- Longer statutes of limitations for specific claims
- Discovery of injury begins time running
- Injuries may be physical or mental

## **EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:**

Replaces the measure.

## **BACKGROUND:**

Under Oregon law, if a person under the age of 18 is abused, including sexually assaulted, the statute of limitations for a civil action does not run until either the person reaches 40 years of age or within five years of the person discovering the causal connection between the abuse and the injury. Like other actions for injury to a person, adults who have been sexually assaulted must bring an action within two years.

House Bill 3293 A extends the statute of limitations for actions on adult sexual assault to seven years from the date the person discovers, or reasonably should have discovered through the exercise of reasonable care, the causal relationship between the assault and an injury.
