

House Bill 2155

Introduced and printed pursuant to House Rule 12.00. Pre-session filed (at the request of House Interim Committee on Revenue)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Updates connection date to federal Internal Revenue Code and other provisions of federal tax law. Removes tax year of taxpayer as connection date for certain changes in Internal Revenue Code that are related to definition of taxable income.

Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

6 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

7 **SECTION 1.** ORS 178.300 is amended to read:

8 178.300. As used in ORS 178.300 to 178.355:

9 (1) "Account" means an individual account established in accordance with ORS 178.300 to
10 178.355.

11 (2) "Account owner" means the person who has the right to withdraw funds from the account.
12 The account owner may also be the designated beneficiary of the account.

13 (3) "Board" means the Oregon 529 Savings Board established under ORS 178.310.

14 (4) "Designated beneficiary" means, except as provided in ORS 178.350, the individual designated
15 at the time the account is opened as having the right to receive a qualified withdrawal for the
16 payment of qualified higher education expenses, or if the designated beneficiary is replaced in ac-
17 cordance with ORS 178.350, the replacement.

18 (5) "Financial institution" means a bank, a commercial bank, a national bank, a savings bank,
19 a savings and loan, a thrift institution, a credit union, an insurance company, a trust company, a
20 mutual fund, an investment firm or other similar entity authorized to do business in this state.

21 (6) "Higher education institution" means an eligible education institution as defined in section
22 529(e)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code.

23 (7) "Internal Revenue Code" means the federal Internal Revenue Code as amended and in effect
24 on December 31, [2017] **2018**.

25 (8) "Member of the family" shall have the same meaning as contained in section 529(e) of the
26 Internal Revenue Code.

27 (9) "Network" means the Oregon 529 Savings Network established under ORS 178.305.

28 (10) "Nonqualified withdrawal" means a withdrawal from an account that is not a qualified
29 withdrawal.

30 (11) "Qualified higher education expenses" means tuition and other permitted expenses as set

1 forth in section 529(e) of the Internal Revenue Code for the enrollment or attendance of a designated
 2 beneficiary at a higher education institution.

3 (12) "Qualified withdrawal" means a withdrawal made as prescribed under ORS 178.355 and
 4 made:

5 (a) From an account to pay the qualified higher education expenses of the designated benefi-
 6 cary;

7 (b) As the result of the death or disability of the designated beneficiary;

8 (c) As the result of a scholarship, allowance or payment described in section 135(d)(1)(A), (B)
 9 or (C) of the Internal Revenue Code that is received by the designated beneficiary, but only to the
 10 extent of the amount of the scholarship, allowance or payment; or

11 (d) As a rollover or change in the designated beneficiary described in ORS 178.350.

12 **SECTION 2.** ORS 238A.005, as amended by section 5, chapter 54, Oregon Laws 2018, and section
 13 2, chapter 101, Oregon Laws 2018, is amended to read:

14 238A.005. For the purposes of this chapter:

15 (1) "Active member" means a member of the pension program or the individual account program
 16 of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan who is actively employed in a qualifying position.

17 (2) "Actuarial equivalent" means a payment or series of payments having the same value as the
 18 payment or series of payments replaced, computed on the basis of interest rate and mortality as-
 19 sumptions adopted by the board.

20 (3) "Board" means the Public Employees Retirement Board.

21 (4) "Eligible employee" means a person who performs services for a participating public em-
 22 ployer, including elected officials other than judges. "Eligible employee" does not include:

23 (a) Persons engaged as independent contractors;

24 (b) Aliens working under a training or educational visa;

25 (c) Persons provided sheltered employment or make-work by a public employer;

26 (d) Persons categorized by a participating public employer as student employees;

27 (e) Any person who is an inmate of a state institution;

28 (f) Employees of foreign trade offices of the Oregon Business Development Department who live
 29 and perform services in foreign countries under the provisions of ORS 285A.075 (1)(g);

30 (g) An employee actively participating in an alternative retirement program established under
 31 ORS 353.250 or an optional retirement plan established under ORS 341.551;

32 (h) Employees of a public university listed in ORS 352.002 who are actively participating in an
 33 optional retirement plan offered under ORS 243.800;

34 (i) Persons employed in positions classified as post-doctoral scholar positions by a public uni-
 35 versity listed in ORS 352.002, or by the Oregon Health and Science University, under ORS 350.370;

36 (j) Any employee who belongs to a class of employees that was not eligible on August 28, 2003,
 37 for membership in the system under the provisions of ORS chapter 238 or other law;

38 (k) Any person who belongs to a class of employees who are not eligible to become members
 39 of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan under the provisions of ORS 238A.070 (2);

40 (L) Any person who is retired under ORS 238A.100 to 238A.250 or ORS chapter 238 and who
 41 continues to receive retirement benefits while employed; and

42 (m) Judges.

43 (5) "Firefighter" means:

44 (a) A person employed by a local government, as defined in ORS 174.116, whose primary job
 45 duties include the fighting of fires;

1 (b) The State Fire Marshal, the chief deputy state fire marshal and deputy state fire marshals;
2 and

3 (c) An employee of the State Forestry Department who is certified by the State Forester as a
4 professional wildland firefighter and whose primary duties include the abatement of uncontrolled
5 fires as described in ORS 477.064.

6 (6) “Fund” means the Public Employees Retirement Fund.

7 (7)(a) “Hour of service” means:

8 (A) An hour for which an eligible employee is directly or indirectly paid or entitled to payment
9 by a participating public employer for performance of duties in a qualifying position; and

10 (B) An hour of vacation, holiday, illness, incapacity, jury duty, military duty or authorized leave
11 during which an employee does not perform duties but for which the employee is directly or indi-
12 rectly paid or entitled to payment by a participating public employer for services in a qualifying
13 position, as long as the hour is within the number of hours regularly scheduled for the performance
14 of duties during the period of vacation, holiday, illness, incapacity, jury duty, military duty or au-
15 thorized leave.

16 (b) “Hour of service” does not include any hour for which payment is made or due under a plan
17 maintained solely for the purpose of complying with applicable unemployment compensation laws.

18 (8) “Inactive member” means a member of the pension program or the individual account pro-
19 gram of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan whose membership has not been terminated, who
20 is not a retired member and who is not employed in a qualifying position.

21 (9) “Individual account program” means the defined contribution individual account program of
22 the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan established under ORS 238A.025.

23 (10) “Institution of higher education” means a public university listed in ORS 352.002, the
24 Oregon Health and Science University or a community college, as defined in ORS 341.005.

25 (11) “Member” means an eligible employee who has established membership in the pension pro-
26 gram or the individual account program of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan and whose
27 membership has not been terminated under ORS 238A.110 or 238A.310.

28 (12) “Participating public employer” means a public employer as defined in ORS 238.005 that
29 provides retirement benefits for employees of the public employer under the system.

30 (13) “Pension program” means the defined benefit pension program of the Oregon Public Service
31 Retirement Plan established under ORS 238A.025.

32 (14) “Police officer” means a police officer as described in ORS 238.005.

33 (15) “Qualifying position” means one or more jobs with one or more participating public em-
34 ployers in which an eligible employee performs 600 or more hours of service in a calendar year,
35 excluding any service in a job for which benefits are not provided under the Oregon Public Service
36 Retirement Plan pursuant to ORS 238A.070 (2).

37 (16) “Retired member” means a pension program member who is receiving a pension as provided
38 in ORS 238A.180 to 238A.195.

39 (17)(a) “Salary” means the remuneration paid to an active member in return for services to the
40 participating public employer, including remuneration in the form of living quarters, board or other
41 items of value, to the extent the remuneration is includable in the employee’s taxable income under
42 Oregon law. “Salary” includes the additional amounts specified in paragraph (b) of this subsection,
43 but does not include the amounts specified in paragraph (c) of this subsection, regardless of whether
44 those amounts are includable in taxable income.

45 (b) “Salary” includes the following amounts:

1 (A) Payments of employee and employer money into a deferred compensation plan that are made
2 at the election of the employee.

3 (B) Contributions to a tax-sheltered or deferred annuity that are made at the election of the
4 employee.

5 (C) Any amount that is contributed to a cafeteria plan or qualified transportation fringe benefit
6 plan by the employer at the election of the employee and that is not includable in the taxable in-
7 come of the employee by reason of 26 U.S.C. 125 or 132(f)(4), as in effect on December 31, [2017]
8 **2018**.

9 (D) Any amount that is contributed to a cash or deferred arrangement by the employer at the
10 election of the employee and that is not included in the taxable income of the employee by reason
11 of 26 U.S.C. 402(e)(3), as in effect on December 31, [2017] **2018**.

12 (E) Retroactive payments described in ORS 238.008.

13 (F) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is paid by
14 the employer and deducted from the compensation of the employee, as provided under ORS 238A.335
15 (1) and (2)(a).

16 (G) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is not paid
17 by the employer under ORS 238A.335.

18 (H) Wages of a deceased member paid to a surviving spouse or dependent children under ORS
19 652.190.

20 (c) "Salary" does not include the following amounts:

21 (A) Travel or any other expenses incidental to employer's business which is reimbursed by the
22 employer.

23 (B) Payments made on account of an employee's death.

24 (C) Any lump sum payment for accumulated unused sick leave, vacation leave or other paid
25 leave.

26 (D) Any severance payment, accelerated payment of an employment contract for a future period
27 or advance against future wages.

28 (E) Any retirement incentive, retirement bonus or retirement gratuitous payment.

29 (F) Payment for a leave of absence after the date the employer and employee have agreed that
30 no future services in a qualifying position will be performed.

31 (G) Payments for instructional services rendered to public universities listed in ORS 352.002 or
32 the Oregon Health and Science University when those services are in excess of full-time employment
33 subject to this chapter. A person employed under a contract for less than 12 months is subject to
34 this subparagraph only for the months covered by the contract.

35 (H) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is paid by
36 the employer and is not deducted from the compensation of the employee, as provided under ORS
37 238A.335 (1) and (2)(b).

38 (I) Compensation described and authorized under ORS 341.556 that is not paid by the community
39 college employing the faculty member.

40 (J) Compensation described and authorized under ORS 352.232 that is not paid by the public
41 university employing the officer or employee.

42 (K) Compensation described and authorized under ORS 353.270 that is not paid by Oregon
43 Health and Science University.

44 (L) Any amount in excess of \$200,000 for a calendar year. If any period over which salary is
45 determined is less than 12 months, the \$200,000 limitation for that period shall be multiplied by a

1 fraction, the numerator of which is the number of months in the determination period and the de-
2 nominator of which is 12. The board shall adopt rules adjusting this dollar limit to incorporate
3 cost-of-living adjustments authorized by the Internal Revenue Service.

4 (18) "System" means the Public Employees Retirement System.

5 (19) "Workers' compensation benefits" means:

6 (a) Payments made under ORS chapter 656; or

7 (b) Payments provided in lieu of workers' compensation benefits under ORS 656.027 (6).

8 **SECTION 3.** ORS 238A.125 is amended to read:

9 238A.125. (1) Upon retiring at normal retirement age, a vested pension program member shall
10 be paid an annual pension for the life of the member as follows:

11 (a) For service as a police officer or firefighter, 1.8 percent of final average salary multiplied
12 by the number of years of retirement credit attributable to service as a police officer or firefighter.

13 (b) For service as other than a police officer or firefighter, 1.5 percent of final average salary
14 multiplied by the number of years of retirement credit attributable to service as other than a police
15 officer or firefighter.

16 (2) Notwithstanding any provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.250, the annual benefit payable to
17 a member under the pension program and under any other tax-qualified defined benefit plan main-
18 tained by the participating public employer may not exceed the applicable limitations set forth in
19 26 U.S.C. 415(b), as in effect on December 31, [2017] **2018**. The Public Employees Retirement Board
20 shall adopt rules for the administration of this limitation, including adjustments in the annual dollar
21 limitation to reflect cost-of-living adjustments authorized by the Internal Revenue Service.

22 (3) The board shall make no actuarial adjustment in a member's pension calculated under this
23 section by reason of the member's retirement after normal retirement age.

24 **SECTION 4.** ORS 238A.150 is amended to read:

25 238A.150. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.250, an eligible em-
26 ployee who leaves a qualifying position for the purpose of performing service in the uniformed ser-
27 vices, and who subsequently returns to employment with a participating public employer with
28 reemployment rights under federal law, is entitled to accrue retirement credit, credit toward the
29 probationary period required by ORS 238A.100 and credit toward the vesting requirements of ORS
30 238A.115 under rules adopted by the Public Employees Retirement Board pursuant to subsection (2)
31 of this section.

32 (2) The board shall adopt rules establishing benefits and service credit for any period of service
33 in the uniformed services by an employee described in subsection (1) of this section. For the purpose
34 of adopting rules under this subsection, the board shall consider and take into account all federal
35 law relating to benefits and service credit for any period of service in the uniformed services, in-
36 cluding 26 U.S.C. 414(u), as in effect on December 31, [2017] **2018**. Benefits and service credit under
37 rules adopted by the board pursuant to this subsection may not exceed benefits and service credit
38 required under federal law for periods of service in the uniformed services.

39 **SECTION 5.** ORS 238A.170 is amended to read:

40 238A.170. (1) An active member of the pension program who is 70-1/2 years of age or older must
41 retire not later than April 1 of the calendar year following the calendar year in which the member
42 terminates employment with all participating public employers. An inactive member of the pension
43 program must retire not later than April 1 of the calendar year following the calendar year in which
44 the member attains 70-1/2 years of age.

45 (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.250, the entire interest of a

1 member of the pension program must be distributed over a time period commencing no later than
 2 the required beginning date set forth in subsection (1) of this section, and must be distributed in a
 3 manner that satisfies all other minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and regu-
 4 lations implementing that section, as in effect on December 31, [2017] **2018**. The Public Employees
 5 Retirement Board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution requirements.

6 **SECTION 6.** ORS 238A.230 is amended to read:

7 238A.230. (1) If a member of the pension program who is vested dies before the member's effec-
 8 tive date of retirement, the Public Employees Retirement Board shall pay the death benefit provided
 9 for in this section to:

10 (a) The spouse of the member to the extent not provided to a former spouse in accordance with
 11 a judgment or order under ORS 238.465;

12 (b) The former spouse of the member as provided in a judgment or order under ORS 238.465; or

13 (c) Any other person who is constitutionally required to be treated in the same manner as a
 14 spouse for the purpose of retirement benefits.

15 (2)(a) The death benefit to be paid under this section shall be for the life of the spouse, former
 16 spouse or other person who is constitutionally required to be treated in the same manner as a
 17 spouse, and shall be the actuarial equivalent of 50 percent of the pension that would otherwise have
 18 been paid to the deceased member.

19 (b) For the purpose of paragraph (a) of this subsection, the amount of the pension that would
 20 otherwise have been paid to the deceased member shall be calculated:

21 (A) As of the date of death if the member dies after the earliest retirement date for the member
 22 under ORS 238A.165; or

23 (B) As if the member became an inactive member on the date of death and thereafter retired
 24 at the earliest retirement date if the member dies before the earliest retirement date for the member
 25 under ORS 238A.165.

26 (3) The death benefit provided under this section is first effective on the first day of the month
 27 following the date of death of the member. The surviving spouse, former spouse or other person
 28 entitled to the death benefit may elect to delay payment of the death benefit, but payment must
 29 commence no later than December 31 of the calendar year in which the member would have reached
 30 70-1/2 years of age.

31 (4) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.250, distributions of death
 32 benefits under the pension program must comply with the minimum distribution requirements of 26
 33 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and the regulations implementing that section, as in effect on December 31, [2017]
 34 **2018**. The board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution requirements.

35 **SECTION 7.** ORS 238A.370 is amended to read:

36 238A.370. Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, the annual addition
 37 to the employee and employer accounts of a member of the individual account program for a cal-
 38 endar year, together with the annual additions to the accounts of the member under any other de-
 39 fined contribution plan maintained by the participating public employer for a calendar year, may
 40 not exceed the lesser of \$40,000, or 100 percent of the member's compensation for that calendar year.
 41 For purposes of this section, "annual addition" has the meaning given that term in 26 U.S.C.
 42 415(c)(2), as in effect on December 31, [2017] **2018**, and "compensation" has the meaning given the
 43 term "participant's compensation" in 26 U.S.C. 415(c)(3), as in effect on December 31, [2017] **2018**.
 44 The Public Employees Retirement Board shall adopt rules for the administration of this limitation,
 45 including adjustments in the annual dollar limitation to reflect cost-of-living adjustments authorized

1 by the Internal Revenue Service.

2 **SECTION 8.** ORS 238A.400 is amended to read:

3 238A.400. (1) Upon retirement on or after the earliest retirement date, as described in ORS
4 238A.165, a member of the individual account program shall receive in a lump sum the amounts in
5 the member's employee account, rollover account and employer account to the extent the member
6 is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320.

7 (2) In lieu of a lump sum payment under subsection (1) of this section, a member of the individ-
8 ual account program may elect to receive the amounts in the member's employee account and em-
9 ployer account, to the extent the member is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320, in
10 substantially equal installments paid over a period of 5, 10, 15 or 20 years, or over a period that is
11 equal to the anticipated life span of the member as actuarially determined by the Public Employees
12 Retirement Board. Installments may be made on a monthly, quarterly or annual basis. In no event
13 may the period selected by the member exceed the time allowed by the minimum distribution re-
14 quirements described in subsection (5) of this section. The board shall by rule establish the manner
15 in which installments will be adjusted to reflect investment gains and losses on the unpaid balance
16 during the payout period elected by the member under this subsection. The board by rule may es-
17 tablish minimum monthly amounts payable under this subsection. The board may require that a
18 lump sum payment, or an installment schedule different than the schedules provided for in this
19 subsection, be used to pay the vested amounts in the member's accounts if those amounts are not
20 adequate to generate the minimum monthly amounts specified by the rule.

21 (3) A member of the individual account program electing to receive installments under sub-
22 section (2) of this section must designate a beneficiary or beneficiaries. In the event the member dies
23 before all amounts in the employee and vested employer accounts are paid, all remaining installment
24 payments shall be made to the beneficiary or beneficiaries designated by the member. A beneficiary
25 may elect to receive a lump sum distribution of the remaining amounts.

26 (4) A member who is entitled to receive retirement benefits under ORS chapter 238 may receive
27 vested amounts in the member's employee account, rollover account and employer account in the
28 manner provided by this section when the member retires for service under the provisions of ORS
29 chapter 238.

30 (5) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, the entire interest of a
31 member of the individual account program must be distributed over a time period commencing no
32 later than the latest retirement date set forth in ORS 238A.170, and must be distributed in a manner
33 that satisfies all other minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and regulations im-
34 plementing that section, as in effect on December 31, [2017] 2018. The board shall adopt rules im-
35 plementing those minimum distribution requirements.

36 **SECTION 9.** ORS 238A.410 is amended to read:

37 238A.410. (1) If a member of the individual account program dies before retirement, the amounts
38 in the member's employee account, rollover account and employer account, to the extent the member
39 is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320, shall be paid in a lump sum to the beneficiary or
40 beneficiaries designated by the member for the purposes of this section.

41 (2) If a member of the individual account program is married at the time of death, or there exists
42 at the time of death any other person who is constitutionally required to be treated in the same
43 manner as a spouse for the purpose of retirement benefits, the spouse or other person shall be the
44 beneficiary for purposes of the death benefit payable under this section unless the spouse or other
45 person consents to the designation of a different beneficiary or beneficiaries before the designation

1 has been made and the consent has not been revoked by the spouse or other person as of the time
2 of the member's death. Consent and revocation of consent must be in writing, acknowledged by a
3 notary public, and submitted to the Public Employees Retirement Board in accordance with rules
4 adopted by the board. If the member's spouse is designated as the member's beneficiary and the
5 marriage of the member and spouse is subsequently dissolved, the former spouse shall be treated as
6 predeceasing the member for purposes of this section, unless the member expressly designates the
7 former spouse as beneficiary after the effective date of the dissolution or the former spouse is re-
8 quired to be designated as a beneficiary under the provisions of ORS 238.465.

9 (3) For purposes of this section and ORS 238A.400 (3), if a member fails to designate a benefi-
10 ciary, or if the person or persons designated do not survive the member, the death benefit provided
11 for in this section shall be paid to the following person or persons, in the following order of priority:

12 (a) The member's surviving spouse or other person who is constitutionally required to be treated
13 in the same manner as a spouse;

14 (b) The member's surviving children, in equal shares; or

15 (c) The member's estate.

16 (4) The entire amount of a deceased member's vested accounts must be distributed by December
17 31 of the fifth calendar year after the year in which the member died. Notwithstanding any other
18 provision of this chapter, distributions of death benefits under the individual account program must
19 comply with the minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and the regulations im-
20 plementing that section, as in effect on December 31, [2017] **2018**. The Public Employees Retirement
21 Board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution requirements.

22 **SECTION 10.** ORS 238A.415 is amended to read:

23 238A.415. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, an eligible em-
24 ployee who leaves a qualifying position for the purpose of performing service in the uniformed ser-
25 vices, and who subsequently returns to employment with a participating public employer with
26 reemployment rights under federal law, is entitled to credit toward the probationary period required
27 by ORS 238A.300, credit toward the vesting requirements of ORS 238A.320 and contributions under
28 rules adopted by the Public Employees Retirement Board pursuant to subsection (2) of this section.

29 (2) The board shall adopt rules establishing contributions and service credit for any period of
30 service in the uniformed services by an employee described in subsection (1) of this section. For the
31 purpose of adopting rules under this subsection, the board shall consider and take into account all
32 federal law relating to benefits and service credit for any period of service in the uniformed ser-
33 vices, including 26 U.S.C. 414(u), as in effect on December 31, [2017] **2018**. Contributions and service
34 credit under rules adopted by the board pursuant to this subsection may not exceed contributions
35 and service credit required under federal law for periods of service in the uniformed services.

36 **SECTION 11.** ORS 238A.430 is amended to read:

37 238A.430. (1) To the extent required by law, and except as otherwise provided by rules adopted
38 by the Public Employees Retirement Board under subsection (4) of this section, any portion of a
39 distribution of benefits described in subsection (2) of this section shall, at the election of and in lieu
40 of distribution to the distributee, be paid directly to an eligible retirement plan specified by the
41 distributee.

42 (2) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section apply to a distribution of any benefit under
43 the pension program or the individual account program except:

44 (a) A distribution that is one of a series of substantially equal periodic payments made at least
45 annually for the life or life expectancy of the distributee, or for the joint lives or life expectancies

1 of the distributee and a designated beneficiary;

2 (b) A distribution that is one of a series of substantially equal periodic payments made at least
3 annually for a specified period of 10 years or more; and

4 (c) A distribution to the extent that the distribution is required under 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9).

7 quired, or voluntary payments permitted, by this chapter.

8 (14) "Valid claim" means any claim for benefits made in accordance with ORS 657.260 if the
9 individual meets the wages-paid-for-employment requirements of ORS 657.150.

10 (15) "Week" means any period of seven consecutive calendar days ending at midnight, as the
11 director may, by regulation, prescribe. The director may by regulation prescribe that a "week" shall
12 be "in," "within," or "during" the calendar quarter that includes the greater part of such week.

13 **SECTION 29. (1) Except as provided in subsections (2) and (3) of this section, the**
14 **amendments to statutes by sections 1 to 28 of this 2019 Act apply to transactions or activities**
15 **occurring on or after January 1, 2019, in tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2019.**

16 **(2) The effective and applicable dates, and the exceptions, special rules and coordination**
17 **with the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, relative to those dates, contained in Making**
18 **Further Continuing Appropriations for the Fiscal Year Ending September 30, 2018 (P.L.**
19 **115-120), the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018 (P.L. 115-123) and other federal law amending the**
20 **Internal Revenue Code and enacted before January 1, 2019, apply for Oregon personal income**
21 **and corporate excise and income tax purposes, to the extent they can be made applicable, in**
22 **the same manner as they are applied under the Internal Revenue Code and related federal**
23 **law.**

24 **(3)(a) If a deficiency is assessed against any taxpayer for a tax year beginning before**
25 **January 1, 2019, and the deficiency or any portion thereof is attributable to any retroactive**
26 **treatment under the amendments to ORS 178.300, 305.230, 305.494, 305.690, 305.842, 314.011,**
27 **314.306, 315.004, 316.012, 316.013, 316.147, 316.157, 317.010, 317.018 and 317.097 by sections 1 and**
28 **13 to 26 of this 2019 Act, then any interest or penalty assessed under ORS chapter 305, 314,**
29 **315, 316, 317 or 318 with respect to the deficiency or portion thereof shall be canceled.**

30 **(b) If a refund is due any taxpayer for a tax year beginning before January 1, 2019, and**
31 **the refund or any portion thereof is due the taxpayer on account of any retroactive treat-**
32 **ment under the amendments to ORS 178.300, 305.230, 305.494, 305.690, 305.842, 314.011, 314.306,**
33 **315.004, 316.012, 316.013, 316.147, 316.157, 317.010, 317.018 and 317.097 by sections 1 and 13 to**
34 **26 of this 2019 Act, for a tax year beginning before January 1, 2019, then notwithstanding**
35 **ORS 305.270 or 314.415 or any other law, the refund or portion thereof shall be paid without**
36 **interest.**

37 **(c) Any changes required because of the amendments to ORS 178.300, 305.230, 305.494,**
38 **305.690, 305.842, 314.011, 314.306, 315.004, 316.012, 316.013, 316.147, 316.157, 317.010, 317.018 and**
39 **317.097 by sections 1 and 13 to 26 of this 2019 Act, for a tax year beginning before January**
40 **1, 2019, shall be made by filing an amended return within the time prescribed by law.**

41 **(d) If a taxpayer fails to file an amended return under paragraph (c) of this subsection,**
42 **the Department of Revenue shall make any changes under paragraph (c) of this subsection**
43 **on the return to which the changes relate within the period specified for issuing a notice of**
44 **deficiency or claiming a refund as otherwise provided by law with respect to that return, or**
45 **within one year after a return for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2019, and be-**

1 fore January 1, 2020, is filed, whichever period expires later.

2 **SECTION 30.** This 2019 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the date on which the 2019
3 regular session of the Eightieth Legislative Assembly adjourns sine die.
