

Senate Bill 680

Sponsored by Senator KNOPP (at the request of Nita Belles)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Creates crime of patronizing a trafficked child. Punishes by maximum of 10 years' imprisonment, \$250,000 fine, or both, if victim is child under 18 years of age. Punishes by maximum of five years' imprisonment, \$125,000 fine, or both, if conviction is based on offer by or to law enforcement officer posing as child under 18 years of age. Directs Oregon Criminal Justice Commission to classify offense as person felony in specified crime category.

Excludes certain evidence of past behavior of alleged victim or witness in prosecution for patronizing a trafficked child.

Authorizes ex parte order for interception of communications when probable cause for patronizing a trafficked child exists.

Adds crime of patronizing a trafficked child to definition of sex crime for purposes of sex offender registration.

Adds crime of patronizing a trafficked child to list of crimes constituting racketeering activity.

Adds allowing child to patronize a trafficked child to definition of child abuse.

Repeals crime of purchasing sex with a minor.

2 Relating to sex trafficking; creating new provisions; amending ORS 40.210, 133.724, 161.005,

4 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

5 **SECTION 1. (1) A person commits the crime of patronizing a trafficked child if the per-**
6 **son engages in, or offers or agrees to engage in, a commercial sex act with:**

7 (a) **A child under 18 years of age; or**

8 (b) **A law enforcement officer who is posing as a child under 18 years of age.**

9 (2) **In any prosecution of a crime described in subsection (1)(a) of this section:**

10 (a) **The state is not required to prove that the defendant knew the child was under 18**
11 **years of age.**

12 (b) **It is not a defense that the defendant did not know the child's age or that the de-**
13 **fendant reasonably believed the child to be 18 years of age or older.**

14 (3)(a) **Patronizing a trafficked child as described in subsection (1)(a) of this section is a**
15 **Class B felony.**

16 (b) **Patronizing a trafficked child as described in subsection (1)(b) of this section is a**
17 **Class C felony.**

18 (4) **As used in this section:**

19 (a) **"Commercial sex act" has the meaning given that term in ORS 163.266.**

20 (b) **"Law enforcement officer" has the meaning given that term in ORS 163.730.**

21 **SECTION 2. (1) The Oregon Criminal Justice Commission shall consider patronizing a**
22 **trafficked child under section 1 of this 2019 Act to be a person felony and classify the crime:**

23 (a) **As a crime category 9 of the sentencing guidelines grid for an offense described in**
24 **section 1 (1)(a) of this 2019 Act.**

NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter *[italic and bracketed]* is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 **(b) As a crime category 7 of the sentencing guidelines grid for an offense described in**
 2 **section 1 (1)(b) of this 2019 Act.**

3 **(2) A court sentencing a person convicted of patronizing a trafficked child shall consider,**
 4 **when determining the person’s criminal history under the sentencing guidelines of the com-**
 5 **mission, the following to be the equivalent of one person felony:**

6 **(a) Two prior convictions of prostitution under ORS 167.007.**

7 **(b) Two prior convictions of commercial sexual solicitation under ORS 167.008.**

8 **(c) One prior conviction of prostitution under ORS 167.007 and one prior conviction of**
 9 **commercial sexual solicitation under ORS 167.008.**

10 **SECTION 3.** ORS 40.210 is amended to read:

11 40.210. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, in a prosecution for a crime described
 12 in ORS 163.266 (1)(b) or (c), 163.355 to 163.427, 163.670 or 167.017 **or section 1 of this 2019 Act**, in
 13 a prosecution for an attempt to commit one of those crimes or in a proceeding conducted under ORS
 14 163.760 to 163.777, the following evidence is not admissible:

15 (a) Reputation or opinion evidence of the past sexual behavior of an alleged victim or a cor-
 16 roborating witness; or

17 (b) Reputation or opinion evidence presented for the purpose of showing that the manner of
 18 dress of an alleged victim incited the crime or, in a proceeding under ORS 163.760 to 163.777, incited
 19 the sexual abuse, or indicated consent to the sexual acts that are alleged.

20 (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, in a prosecution for a crime or an attempt to
 21 commit a crime listed in subsection (1) of this section or in a proceeding conducted under ORS
 22 163.760 to 163.777, evidence of an alleged victim’s past sexual behavior other than reputation or
 23 opinion evidence is also not admissible, unless the evidence other than reputation or opinion evi-
 24 dence:

25 (a) Is admitted in accordance with subsection (4) of this section; and

26 (b) Is evidence that:

27 (A) Relates to the motive or bias of the alleged victim;

28 (B) Is necessary to rebut or explain scientific or medical evidence offered by the state; or

29 (C) Is otherwise constitutionally required to be admitted.

30 (3) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, in a prosecution for a crime or an attempt to
 31 commit a crime listed in subsection (1) of this section or in a proceeding conducted under ORS
 32 163.760 to 163.777, evidence, other than reputation or opinion evidence, of the manner of dress of
 33 the alleged victim or a corroborating witness, presented by a person accused of committing the
 34 crime or, in a proceeding conducted under ORS 163.760 to 163.777, by the respondent, is also not
 35 admissible, unless the evidence [*is*]:

36 (a) **Is** admitted in accordance with subsection (4) of this section; and

37 (b) Is evidence that:

38 (A) Relates to the motive or bias of the alleged victim;

39 (B) Is necessary to rebut or explain scientific, medical or testimonial evidence offered by the
 40 state;

41 (C) Is necessary to establish the identity of the alleged victim; or

42 (D) Is otherwise constitutionally required to be admitted.

43 (4)(a) If the person accused of a crime or an attempt to commit a crime listed in subsection (1)
 44 of this section, or the respondent in a proceeding conducted under ORS 163.760 to 163.777, intends
 45 to offer evidence under subsection (2) or (3) of this section, the accused or the respondent shall make

1 a written motion to offer the evidence not later than 15 days before the date on which the trial in
2 which the evidence is to be offered is scheduled to begin, except that the court may allow the mo-
3 tion to be made at a later date, including during trial, if the court determines either that the evi-
4 dence is newly discovered and could not have been obtained earlier through the exercise of due
5 diligence or that the issue to which the evidence relates has newly arisen in the case. Any motion
6 made under this paragraph shall be served on all other parties and, in a criminal proceeding, on the
7 alleged victim through the office of the prosecutor.

8 (b) The motion described in paragraph (a) of this subsection shall be accompanied by a written
9 offer of proof. If the court determines that the offer of proof contains evidence described in sub-
10 section (2) or (3) of this section, the court shall order a hearing in camera to determine if the evi-
11 dence is admissible. At the hearing the parties may call witnesses, including the alleged victim, and
12 offer relevant evidence. Notwithstanding ORS 40.030 (2), if the relevancy of the evidence that the
13 accused or the respondent seeks to offer in the trial depends upon the fulfillment of a condition of
14 fact, the court, at the hearing in camera or at a subsequent hearing in camera scheduled for the
15 same purpose, shall accept evidence on the issue of whether the condition of fact is fulfilled and
16 shall determine the issue.

17 (c) If the court determines on the basis of the hearing described in paragraph (b) of this sub-
18 section that the evidence the accused or the respondent seeks to offer is relevant and that the
19 probative value of the evidence outweighs the danger of unfair prejudice, the evidence shall be ad-
20 missible in the trial to the extent an order made by the court specifies evidence that may be offered
21 and areas with respect to which a witness may be examined or cross-examined.

22 (d) An order admitting evidence under this subsection in a criminal prosecution may be appealed
23 by the state before trial.

24 (5) For purposes of this section:

25 (a) "Alleged victim" includes the petitioner in a proceeding conducted under ORS 163.760 to
26 163.777.

27 (b) "In camera" means out of the presence of the public and the jury.

28 (c) "Past sexual behavior" means sexual behavior other than:

29 (A) The sexual behavior with respect to which the crime or attempt to commit the crime listed
30 in subsection (1) of this section is alleged; or

31 (B) In a proceeding conducted under ORS 163.760 to 163.777, the alleged sexual abuse.

32 (d) "Trial" includes a hearing conducted under ORS 163.760 to 163.777.

33 **SECTION 4.** ORS 133.724 is amended to read:

34 133.724. (1) An ex parte order for the interception of wire, electronic or oral communications
35 may be issued by any circuit court judge upon written application made upon oath or affirmation
36 of the individual who is the district attorney or a deputy district attorney authorized by the district
37 attorney for the county in which the order is sought. The application shall include:

38 (a) The name of the district attorney or the deputy district attorney making the application and
39 the authority of the district attorney or the deputy district attorney to make the application;

40 (b) The identity of the investigative or law enforcement officer making the application and the
41 officer authorizing the application;

42 (c) A statement demonstrating that there is probable cause to believe that an individual is
43 committing, has committed or is about to commit:

44 (A) A particular felony of murder, kidnapping, arson, robbery, bribery, extortion or other crime
45 dangerous to life and punishable as a felony;

1 (B) A crime punishable as a felony under ORS 163.266 (1)(b) or (c), [163.413,] 166.720, 167.012,
 2 167.017, 475.752, 475.806 to 475.894 or 475.904 to 475.910 **or section 1 of this 2019 Act** or as a
 3 misdemeanor under ORS 167.007 or 167.008; or

4 (C) Any conspiracy to commit any of the foregoing crimes;

5 (d) A statement of the details, if known, of the particular crime alleged under paragraph (c) of
 6 this subsection;

7 (e) A particular description of the nature and location of the facilities from which or the place
 8 where the wire, electronic or oral communication is to be intercepted, if known;

9 (f) A particular description of the type of wire, electronic or oral communication sought to be
 10 intercepted;

11 (g) The identity of the person, if known, suspected of committing the crime and whose wire,
 12 electronic or oral communications are to be intercepted;

13 (h) A full and complete statement as to whether or not other investigative procedures have been
 14 tried and failed or why other investigative procedures reasonably appear to be unlikely to succeed
 15 if tried or are likely to be too dangerous;

16 (i) A statement of the period of time for which the interception is required to be maintained. If
 17 the nature of the investigation is such that the authorization for interception should not automat-
 18 ically terminate when the described type of wire, electronic or oral communication has been first
 19 obtained, a description of facts establishing probable cause to believe that additional communi-
 20 cations of the same type will occur thereafter;

21 (j) A statement as to whether any prior application has been made to intercept wire, electronic
 22 or oral communications from the same person and, if such prior application exists, a statement of
 23 the current status of that application; and

24 (k) Where the application is for the extension of an existing order, a statement setting forth the
 25 results thus far obtained from the interception, or a reasonable explanation of the failure to obtain
 26 such results.

27 (2) The judge may require the applicant to furnish further testimony or documentary evidence
 28 in support of the application.

29 (3) Upon examination of such application and evidence the judge may enter an ex parte order,
 30 as requested or as modified, authorizing or approving interception of wire, electronic or oral com-
 31 munications within the state if the judge determines on the basis of the facts submitted by the ap-
 32 plicant that:

33 (a) There is probable cause for belief that an individual is committing, has committed or is about
 34 to commit a particular crime described in subsection (1)(c) of this section;

35 (b) There is probable cause for belief that particular communications concerning that crime will
 36 be obtained through such interception;

37 (c) Normal investigative procedures have been tried and have failed or reasonably appear to be
 38 unlikely to succeed if tried or are likely to be too dangerous; and

39 (d) There is probable cause for belief that the facilities from which, or the place where, the wire,
 40 electronic or oral communications to be intercepted are being used, or are about to be used, in
 41 connection with the planning or the commission of that crime are open to the public or are owned
 42 by, leased to, listed in the name of, or commonly used by the individual suspected.

43 (4) Each order authorizing or approving the interception of any wire, electronic or oral com-
 44 munication shall specify:

45 (a) The identity of the person, if known, whose communications are to be intercepted;

1 (b) The nature and location of the communications facilities as to which, or the place where,
2 authority to intercept is granted;

3 (c) A particular description of the type of communication sought to be intercepted, and a state-
4 ment of the particular crime to which it relates;

5 (d) The identity of the agency authorized to intercept the communications and of the person
6 authorizing the application;

7 (e) The period of time during which such interception is authorized, including a statement as to
8 whether or not the interception shall automatically terminate when the described communication
9 has been first obtained; and

10 (f) The name of the applicant, date of issuance, and the signature and title of the issuing judge.

11 (5) An order entered pursuant to this section may not authorize or approve the interception of
12 any wire, electronic or oral communication for any period longer than is necessary to achieve the
13 objective of authorization and in no event for longer than 30 days. Extensions of any order may be
14 granted, but only when application for an extension is made in accordance with subsection (1)(k) of
15 this section and the court makes the findings required by subsection (3) of this section. The period
16 of extension shall be no longer than the authorizing judge deems necessary to achieve the purpose
17 for which it is granted and in no event for longer than 30 days. Every order and extension of that
18 order shall contain a provision that the authorization to intercept must be executed as soon as
19 practicable, must be conducted in such a way as to minimize the interception of communications not
20 otherwise subject to interception, and must terminate upon attainment of the authorized objective,
21 or in any event in 30 days.

22 (6) Whenever an order authorizing interception is entered pursuant to this section, the order
23 may require reports to be made to the judge who issued the order showing what progress has been
24 made toward achievement of the authorized objective and the need for continued interception. Such
25 reports shall be made at such intervals as the judge may require.

26 **SECTION 5.** ORS 163A.005 is amended to read:

27 163A.005. As used in ORS 163A.005 to 163A.235:

28 (1) "Another United States court" means a federal court, a military court, the tribal court of a
29 federally recognized Indian tribe or a court of:

30 (a) A state other than Oregon;

31 (b) The District of Columbia;

32 (c) The Commonwealth of Puerto Rico;

33 (d) Guam;

34 (e) American Samoa;

35 (f) The Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands; or

36 (g) The United States Virgin Islands.

37 (2) "Attends" means is enrolled on a full-time or part-time basis.

38 (3)(a) "Correctional facility" means any place used for the confinement of persons:

39 (A) Charged with or convicted of a crime or otherwise confined under a court order.

40 (B) Found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court for having committed an act that
41 if committed by an adult would constitute a crime.

42 (b) "Correctional facility" applies to a state hospital or a secure intensive community inpatient
43 facility only as to persons detained therein charged with or convicted of a crime, or detained therein
44 after being found guilty except for insanity under ORS 161.290 to 161.370 or responsible except for
45 insanity under ORS 419C.411.

1 (4) "Institution of higher education" means a public or private educational institution that pro-
2 vides a program of post-secondary education.

3 (5) "Sex crime" means:

4 (a) Rape in any degree;

5 (b) Sodomy in any degree;

6 (c) Unlawful sexual penetration in any degree;

7 (d) Sexual abuse in any degree;

8 (e) Incest with a child victim;

9 (f) Using a child in a display of sexually explicit conduct;

10 (g) Encouraging child sexual abuse in any degree;

11 (h) Transporting child pornography into the state;

12 (i) Paying for viewing a child's sexually explicit conduct;

13 (j) Compelling prostitution;

14 (k) Promoting prostitution;

15 (L) Kidnapping in the first degree if the victim was under 18 years of age;

16 (m) Contributing to the sexual delinquency of a minor;

17 (n) Sexual misconduct if the offender is at least 18 years of age;

18 (o) Possession of materials depicting sexually explicit conduct of a child in the first degree;

19 (p) Kidnapping in the second degree if the victim was under 18 years of age, except by a parent
20 or by a person found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court;

21 (q) Online sexual corruption of a child in any degree if the offender reasonably believed the
22 child to be more than five years younger than the offender;

7 (7) "Works" or "carries on a vocation" means full-time or part-time employment for more than

10 **SECTION 6.** ORS 166.715 is amended to read:

11 166.715. As used in ORS 166.715 to 166.735, unless the context requires otherwise:

12 (1) "Documentary material" means any book, paper, document, writing, drawing, graph, chart,
13 photograph, phonograph record, magnetic tape, computer printout, other data compilation from
14 which information can be obtained or from which information can be translated into usable form,
15 or other tangible item.

16 (2) "Enterprise" includes any individual, sole proprietorship, partnership, corporation, business
17 trust or other profit or nonprofit legal entity, and includes any union, association or group of indi-
18 viduals associated in fact although not a legal entity, and both illicit and licit enterprises and gov-
19 ernmental and nongovernmental entities.

20 (3) "Investigative agency" means the Department of Justice or any district attorney.

21 (4) "Pattern of racketeering activity" means engaging in at least two incidents of racketeering
22 activity that have the same or similar intents, results, accomplices, victims or methods of commis-
23 sion or otherwise are interrelated by distinguishing characteristics, including a nexus to the same
24 enterprise, and are not isolated incidents, provided at least one of such incidents occurred after
25 November 1, 1981, and that the last of such incidents occurred within five years after a prior inci-
26 dent of racketeering activity. Notwithstanding ORS 131.505 to 131.525 or 419A.190 or any other
27 provision of law providing that a previous prosecution is a bar to a subsequent prosecution, conduct
28 that constitutes an incident of racketeering activity may be used to establish a pattern of

34 real or personal property.

35 (6) "Racketeering activity" includes conduct of a person committed both before and after the
36 person attains the age of 18 years, and means to commit, to attempt to commit, to conspire to
37 commit, or to solicit, coerce or intimidate another person to commit:

38 (a) Any conduct that constitutes a crime, as defined in ORS 161.515, under any of the following
39 provisions of the Oregon Revised Statutes:

40 (A) ORS 59.005 to 59.505, 59.710 to 59.830, 59.991 and 59.995, relating to securities;
