## **Senate Concurrent Resolution 33**

Sponsored by Senators WINTERS, STEINER HAYWARD; Senator HANSELL

## **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.** 

Declares that lung cancer is public health priority.

Urges increased awareness of risk factors, screening options and treatment alternatives.

1	CONCURRENT RESOLUTION
2	Whereas lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer-related death in Oregon, the United States
3	and the world; and
4	Whereas lung cancer takes approximately 150,000 lives in the United States annually, which is
5	more than from breast, colorectal and prostate cancers combined; and
6	Whereas lung cancer accounts for approximately 25 percent of all cancer-related deaths; and
7	Whereas 50 percent more women die from lung cancer than breast cancer; and
8	Whereas more than 200,000 new cases of lung cancer will be diagnosed in 2019, most at an ad
9	vanced stage due to the lack of standardized screening for early detection and a failure to recognize
10	early symptoms; and
11	Whereas approximately one in 15 Americans will be diagnosed with lung cancer during their
12	lifetime; and
13	Whereas approximately 20 percent of those with lung cancer have never smoked, and
l4	nonsmokers are most likely to be diagnosed with non-small cell lung cancer; and
15	Whereas small cell lung cancer is almost uniformly diagnosed in smokers or former smokers, and
16	13 percent of all lung cancer diagnoses are small cell lung cancer; and
L7	Whereas there are significant disparities in lung cancer incidence and survival rates across
18	gender, race and ethnicity; and
19	Whereas lung cancer screenings can find abnormal tissues or lung cancer at an early stage
20	before a person has symptoms; and
21	Whereas early detection of lung cancer dramatically improves survival rates, but only 15 per
22	cent of lung cancers are diagnosed in early stages; and
23	Whereas research for an early diagnostic test and more effective treatments are crucial in the
24	fight against lung cancer; and
25	Whereas lung cancer research has been chronically underfunded in proportion to its public
26	health impact, and trails far behind funding for research on other cancers; and
