**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO  
HOUSE BILL 2262**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 3, delete “and 417.827” and insert “,  
2 417.827 and 417.847”.

3 After line 25, insert:

4 “(B) Ensure that at least one member represents the tribes of this  
5 state;”.

6 In line 26, delete “(B)” and insert “(C)”.

7 On page 2, line 2, delete “(C)” and insert “(D)”.

8 In line 6, after “agencies” insert a period and delete the rest of the line  
9 and lines 7 and 8.

10 After line 36, insert:

11 “(B) Ensure that at least one member represents the tribes of this  
12 state;”.

13 In line 37, delete “(B)” and insert “(C)”.

14 In line 44, delete “(C)” and insert “(D)”.

15 On page 3, line 3, after “agencies” insert a period and delete the rest of  
16 the line and lines 4 and 5.

17 On page 8, after line 28, insert:

18 “**SECTION 11.** ORS 417.847, as amended by section 63, chapter 774,  
19 Oregon Laws 2015, and section 36, chapter 17, Oregon Laws 2017, is amended  
20 to read:

21 “417.847. (1) The Youth Development Council is established.

1       “(2) The council is established for the purpose of [*overseeing*] **coordinat-**  
2 **ing** a unified **and aligned** system that provides services to school-age chil-  
3 dren through youth 24 years of age in a manner that supports educational  
4 success, focuses on crime prevention, reduces high risk behaviors and is in-  
5 tegrated, measurable and accountable. The council shall provide direction to  
6 the Youth Development Division.

7       “(3) The council consists of no fewer than 15 members who are appointed  
8 by the Governor. The Governor shall ensure that membership of the council  
9 satisfies any federal requirements for membership of a state advisory com-  
10 mittee on juvenile justice, and shall include tribal representation in the  
11 membership of the council.

12       “(4) The council shall:

13       “(a) Determine the availability of funding to support community-based  
14 youth development programs, services and initiatives with demonstrated  
15 outcomes and strategic objectives established by the council by rule.

16       “(b) Prioritize funding for services related to:

17       “(A) The prevention of and intervention in the risk factors that lead to  
18 juvenile delinquency and the promotion of protective factors that improve  
19 the health and well-being of children and youth, as supported by evidence-  
20 based program models and other research-based models; and

21       “(B) The prevention of and intervention in gang violence and gang in-  
22 volvement.

23       “(5) The council may:

24       “(a) Enter into performance-based intergovernmental agreements with re-  
25 gional and county entities, and tribal governments, to contract for the pro-  
26 vision of youth development programs, services and initiatives that will  
27 achieve demonstrated outcomes and strategic objectives established by the  
28 council by rule.

29       “(b) Determine the means by which services to children and youth may  
30 be provided effectively and efficiently across multiple programs to improve

1 the academic and social outcomes of children and youth.

2 “(c) Assess state programs and services related to youth development and  
3 training, and identify methods by which programs and services may be [*co-*  
4 *ordinated or consolidated*] **aligned or unified**.

5 “(d) Establish common academic and social indicators to support attain-  
6 ment of goals established by the council.

7 “(e) Establish common program outcome measurements and coordinate  
8 data collection across multiple programs and services.

9 “(f) Ensure implementation of best practices that:

10 “(A) Are evidence based;

11 “(B) Are culturally, gender and age appropriate;

12 “(C) Address individual risk factors;

13 “(D) Build upon factors that improve the health and well-being of children  
14 and youth; and

15 “(E) Include tribal best practices.

16 “(6) The Governor may designate one member of the council to serve as  
17 the chairperson or, if the Governor chooses not to designate a chairperson,  
18 the council may elect one of its members to serve as chairperson.

19 “(7) In accordance with applicable provisions of ORS chapter 183, the  
20 council may adopt rules necessary for the administration of the laws that the  
21 council is charged with administering.”.

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
