**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
HOUSE BILL 2113**

1 In line 2 of the printed bill, after “wildlife” insert “; amending ORS
2 496.146, 497.022, 497.061, 497.112 and 497.132 and section 22, chapter 779,
3 Oregon Laws 2015”.

4 Delete lines 4 through 18 and insert:

5 **“SECTION 1.** ORS 497.132 is amended to read:

6 “497.132. (1)(a) In lieu of issuing to resident persons separate licenses for
7 hunting and angling, the State Fish and Wildlife Commission is authorized
8 to issue resident annual combination hunting and angling licenses, and
9 charge the applicable fee under the fee schedule in ORS 497.061.

10 “(b) In lieu of issuing to resident senior citizens separate licenses for
11 hunting and angling, the commission is authorized to issue resident annual
12 senior citizen combination hunting and angling licenses for persons 70 years
13 of age or older who have resided in the state for not less than five years
14 prior to the date of application.

15 “(2) The commission is authorized to issue, upon application, resident
16 annual pioneer combination hunting and angling licenses for persons who
17 will be 65 years of age or older in the license year and who have resided in
18 the state for not less than 50 years prior to the date of application, and to
19 charge the applicable fee under the fee schedule in ORS 497.061. The resident
20 annual pioneer combination license shall be equivalent to, and authorize the
21 purchaser to engage in the activities authorized by, a resident annual com-

1 bination license.

2 **“(3) The commission is authorized to issue, upon application, resi-**
3 **dent low annual income combination hunting and angling licenses for**
4 **persons who are residents of this state and have household gross in-**
5 **come that does not exceed 130 percent of the federal poverty level for**
6 **similarly sized households. The resident annual low income combina-**
7 **tion license shall be equivalent to, and authorize the purchaser to en-**
8 **gage in the activities authorized by, a resident annual combination**
9 **license.**

10 “[3)(a)] **(4)(a)** In lieu of issuing to resident persons separate licenses and
11 tags for various hunting and angling activities, the commission is authorized
12 to issue resident annual sportspac licenses and shall charge the applicable
13 fee under the fee schedule in ORS 497.061. The purchaser of each sportspac
14 license is authorized to engage in those hunting and angling activities for
15 which the following licenses and tags are required:

16 “(A) Combination license;

17 “(B) Black bear tag;

18 “(C) Cougar tag;

19 “(D) General season elk tag;

20 “(E) General season deer tag;

21 “(F) Upland bird stamp;

22 “(G) Oregon migratory waterfowl stamp;

23 “(H) Turkey tag;

24 “(I) Annual combined angling tag to angle for salmon, steelhead trout,
25 sturgeon and halibut; and

26 “(J) Resident annual shellfish license.

27 “(b) The holder of each sportspac license who wishes to engage in hunting
28 or angling activities for which permits are required that are limited by quota
29 must participate in the process for allocation of the permits in the same
30 manner as all other permit applicants. However, if the holder of a sportspac

1 license is unsuccessful in obtaining a permit limited by quota for a particular
2 activity, the holder will be issued a tag valid for any general season for that
3 species.

4 “(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of the wildlife laws, of the
5 moneys received from the sale of sportspac licenses:

6 “(A) Four dollars from each license shall be credited to the subaccount
7 referred to in ORS 496.242.

8 “(B) Four dollars from each license shall be credited to the subaccount
9 referred to in ORS 496.283.

10 “(C) Seventy-five cents from each license shall be credited to the Fish
11 Screening Subaccount established under ORS 496.303.

12 “(D) Twenty-five cents from each license shall be credited to the Fish
13 Passage Fund established under ORS 497.139.

14 “[~~(4)(a)~~] **(5)(a)** In lieu of issuing to resident persons at least 12 years of
15 age and under 18 years of age separate licenses and tags for hunting and
16 angling, the commission is authorized to issue resident annual youth
17 sportspac licenses for persons at least 12 years of age and under 18 years of
18 age and shall charge the applicable fee under the fee schedule in ORS
19 497.061. The purchaser of each youth sportspac license is authorized to en-
20 gage in those hunting and angling activities for which the following licenses
21 and tags are required:

22 “(A) Youth license;

23 “(B) Black bear tag;

24 “(C) Cougar tag;

25 “(D) General season elk tag;

26 “(E) General season deer tag;

27 “(F) Youth upland bird stamp;

28 “(G) Youth Oregon migratory waterfowl stamp;

29 “(H) Youth turkey tag; and

30 “(I) Annual youth combined angling tag for persons under 18 years of age

1 to angle for salmon, steelhead trout, sturgeon and halibut.

2 “(b) The holder of each resident annual youth sportspac license who
3 wishes to engage in hunting or angling activities for which permits are re-
4 quired that are limited by quota must participate in the process for allo-
5 cation of the permits in the same manner as all other permit applicants.
6 However, if the holder of a resident annual youth sportspac license is un-
7 successful in obtaining a permit limited by quota for a particular activity,
8 the holder will be issued a tag valid for any general season for that species.

9 “(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of the wildlife laws, of the
10 moneys received from the sale of resident annual youth sportspac licenses:

11 “(A) One dollar from each license shall be credited to the subaccount re-
12 ferred to in ORS 496.242.

13 “(B) One dollar from each license shall be credited to the subaccount re-
14 ferred to in ORS 496.283.

15 “(C) Seventy-five cents from each license shall be credited to the Fish
16 Screening Subaccount established under ORS 496.303.

17 “(D) Twenty-five cents from each license shall be credited to the Fish
18 Passage Fund established under ORS 497.139.

19 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 496.146, as amended by section 3, chapter 100, Oregon
20 Laws 2018, is amended to read:

21 “496.146. In addition to any other duties or powers provided by law, the
22 State Fish and Wildlife Commission:

23 “(1) May accept, from whatever source, appropriations, gifts or grants of
24 money or other property for the purposes of wildlife management, and use
25 such money or property for wildlife management purposes.

26 “(2) May sell or exchange property owned by the state and used for
27 wildlife management purposes when the commission determines that such
28 sale or exchange would be advantageous to the state wildlife policy and
29 management programs.

30 “(3) May acquire, introduce, propagate and stock wildlife species in such

1 manner as the commission determines will carry out the state wildlife policy
2 and management programs.

3 “(4) May by rule authorize the issuance of such licenses, tags and permits
4 for angling, taking, hunting and trapping and may prescribe such tagging
5 and sealing procedures as the commission determines necessary to carry out
6 the provisions of the wildlife laws or to obtain information for use in wildlife
7 management. Permits issued pursuant to this subsection may include special
8 hunting permits for a person and immediate family members of the person
9 to hunt on land owned by that person in areas where permits for deer or elk
10 are limited by quota. As used in this subsection, ‘immediate family
11 members’ means spouses in a marriage, parents, brothers, brothers-in-law,
12 sisters, sisters-in-law, sons, sons-in-law, daughters, daughters-in-law,
13 stepchildren and grandchildren. A landowner who is qualified to receive
14 landowner preference tags from the commission may request two additional
15 tags for providing public access and two additional tags for wildlife habitat
16 programs. This request shall be made to the Access and Habitat Board with
17 supporting evidence that the access is significant and the habitat programs
18 benefit wildlife. The board may recommend that the commission grant the
19 request. When a landowner is qualified under landowner preference rules
20 adopted by the commission and receives a controlled hunt tag for that unit
21 or a landowner preference tag for the landowner’s property and does not use
22 the tag during the regular season, the landowner may use that tag to take
23 an antlerless animal, when approved by the State Department of Fish and
24 Wildlife, to alleviate damage that is presently occurring to the landowner’s
25 property.

26 “(5) May by rule prescribe procedures requiring the holder of any license,
27 tag or permit issued pursuant to the wildlife laws to keep records and make
28 reports concerning the time, manner and place of taking wildlife, the quan-
29 tities taken and such other information as the commission determines nec-
30 essary for proper enforcement of the wildlife laws or to obtain information

1 for use in wildlife management.

2 “(6) May establish special hunting and angling areas or seasons in which
3 only persons less than 18 years of age or over 65 years of age are permitted
4 to hunt or angle.

5 “(7) May acquire by purchase, lease, agreement or gift real property and
6 all appropriate interests therein for wildlife management and wildlife-
7 oriented recreation purposes.

8 “(8) May acquire by purchase, lease, agreement, gift, exercise of eminent
9 domain or otherwise real property and all interests therein and establish,
10 operate and maintain thereon public hunting areas.

11 “(9) May establish and develop wildlife refuge and management areas and
12 prescribe rules governing the use of such areas and the use of wildlife refuge
13 and management areas established and developed pursuant to any other
14 provision of law.

15 “(10) May by rule prescribe fees for licenses, tags, permits and applica-
16 tions issued or required pursuant to the wildlife laws, and user charges for
17 angling, hunting or other recreational uses of lands owned or managed by
18 the commission, unless such fees or user charges are otherwise prescribed
19 by law. No fee or user charge prescribed by the commission pursuant to this
20 subsection shall exceed \$250.

21 “(11) May enter into contracts with any person or governmental agency
22 for the development and encouragement of wildlife research and management
23 programs and projects.

24 “(12) May perform such acts as may be necessary for the establishment
25 and implementation of cooperative wildlife management programs with
26 agencies of the federal government.

27 “(13) May offer and pay rewards for the arrest and conviction of any
28 person who has violated any of the wildlife laws. No such reward shall ex-
29 ceed \$1,000 for any one arrest and conviction.

30 “(14) May by rule prescribe fees for falconry licenses issued pursuant to

1 the wildlife laws, unless such fees are otherwise prescribed by law. Fees
2 prescribed by the commission pursuant to this subsection shall be based on
3 actual or projected costs of administering falconry regulations and shall not
4 exceed \$250.

5 “(15) May establish special fishing and hunting seasons and bag limits
6 applicable only to persons with disabilities.

7 “(16) May adopt optimum populations for deer and elk consistent with
8 ORS 496.012. These population levels shall be reviewed at least once every
9 five years.

10 “(17) Shall establish a preference system so that individuals who are un-
11 successful in controlled hunt permit drawings for deer and elk hunting have
12 reasonable assurance of success in those drawings in subsequent years. In
13 establishing the preference system, the commission shall consider giving ad-
14 ditional preference points to persons who have been issued a resident annual
15 pioneer combination license **or resident annual low income combination**
16 **license** pursuant to ORS 497.132.

17 “(18) May sell advertising in State Department of Fish and Wildlife pub-
18 lications, including annual hunting and angling regulation publications.

19 “(19) May, notwithstanding the fees required by ORS 497.112, provide free
20 hunting tags to an organization that sponsors hunting trips for terminally
21 ill children. Except as provided under section 2, chapter 100, Oregon Laws
22 2018, the State Department of Fish and Wildlife may not issue more than 15
23 tags annually under this subsection.

24 “(20) Shall, after consultation with the State Department of Agriculture,
25 adopt rules prohibiting the use of the World Wide Web, other Internet pro-
26 tocols or broadcast or closed circuit media to remotely control a weapon for
27 the purpose of hunting any game bird, wildlife, game mammal or other
28 mammal. The rules may exempt the State Department of Fish and Wildlife
29 or agents of the department from the prohibition.

30 “(21) May adopt rules establishing a schedule of civil penalties, not to

1 exceed \$6,500 per violation, for violations of provisions of the wildlife laws
2 or rules adopted by the commission under the wildlife laws. Civil penalties
3 established under this subsection must be imposed in the manner provided
4 by ORS 183.745 and must be deposited in the State Wildlife Fund established
5 under ORS 496.300.

6 “(22) May by rule impose a surcharge not to exceed \$25 for the renewal
7 of a hunting license on any person who fails to comply with mandatory
8 hunting reporting requirements. Amounts collected as surcharges under this
9 subsection must be deposited in the State Wildlife Fund established under
10 ORS 496.300.

11 “(23) May by rule establish annual and daily Columbia Basin salmon,
12 steelhead and sturgeon recreational fishing endorsements with a fee not to
13 exceed \$9.75 per annual license and \$1 per day per daily license. An
14 endorsement is required to fish for salmon, steelhead or sturgeon in portions
15 of the Columbia Basin as designated by rule and is in addition to and not
16 in lieu of angling licenses and tags required under the wildlife laws.
17 Amounts collected as fees under this subsection must be deposited in the
18 Columbia River Fisheries Enhancement Fund established under section 7,
19 chapter 672, Oregon Laws 2013.

20 “(24) May by rule establish multiyear licenses and may prescribe fees for
21 such licenses. Fees prescribed by the commission for multiyear licenses may
22 provide for a discount from the annual license fees that would otherwise be
23 payable for the period of time covered by the multiyear license.

24 “(25) May by rule establish a program to offer unique fishing opportu-
25 nities through drawings, raffles or auctions and charge application and par-
26 ticipation fees for the program.

27 **“SECTION 3.** ORS 496.146, as amended by section 10, chapter 672, Oregon
28 Laws 2013, section 52, chapter 629, Oregon Laws 2015, section 8, chapter 779,
29 Oregon Laws 2015, and section 4, chapter 100, Oregon Laws 2018, is amended
30 to read:

1 “496.146. In addition to any other duties or powers provided by law, the
2 State Fish and Wildlife Commission:

3 “(1) May accept, from whatever source, appropriations, gifts or grants of
4 money or other property for the purposes of wildlife management, and use
5 such money or property for wildlife management purposes.

28 **“SECTION 4.** ORS 497.022 is amended to read:

29 “497.022. (1) The State Fish and Wildlife Commission may appoint agents
30 to issue any of the licenses, tags or permits the commission is authorized by

1 law to issue. The commission shall prescribe the procedure for the issuance
2 of such licenses, tags and permits. Agents of the commission shall issue li-
3 censes, tags and permits in accordance with the prescribed procedure and
4 shall charge and collect the fees prescribed by law therefor.

5 “(2)(a) As part of the fees prescribed in the fee schedule under ORS
6 497.061 and in addition to fees otherwise prescribed by law for the issuance
7 of a license, tag or permit, the issuing agent shall charge and collect:

8 “(A) For each resident annual sportspac license issued pursuant to ORS
9 497.132 [(3)(a) and] (4)(a) **and (5)(a)**, \$5.

10 “(B) For each nonresident annual hunting license issued pursuant to ORS
11 497.102, \$10.

12 “(C) For each nonresident annual deer tag, nonresident annual elk tag,
13 nonresident annual black bear tag, nonresident annual mountain goat tag,
14 nonresident annual mountain sheep tag and nonresident annual antelope tag
15 issued pursuant to ORS 497.112 (1), \$10.

16 “(D) For any other license, tag or permit, \$2 each.

17 “(b) If the agent is a county clerk, the agent shall deposit the agent fees
18 provided for in this section in the general fund of the county for which the
19 agent is the clerk. If the agent is an employee of the State Department of
20 Fish and Wildlife, the agent fees shall be deposited in the State Wildlife
21 Fund. Agents other than county clerks or department employees who issue
22 licenses without the use of a state computerized licensing system may retain
23 the agent fees for their license tag or permit issuance services. Agents other
24 than county clerks or department employees who issue licenses, tags or per-
25 mits using a state computerized licensing system may retain a portion of the
26 agent fees not less than:

27 “(A) For each resident annual sportspac license issued pursuant to ORS
28 497.132 [(3)(a) and] (4)(a) **and (5)(a)**, \$2.50.

29 “(B) For each nonresident annual hunting license issued pursuant to ORS
30 497.102, \$7.50.

1 “(C) For each nonresident annual deer tag, nonresident annual elk tag,
2 nonresident annual black bear tag, nonresident annual mountain goat tag,
3 nonresident annual mountain sheep tag and nonresident annual antelope tag
4 issued pursuant to ORS 497.112 (1), \$7.50.

5 “(D) For any other license, tag or permit, as may be specified by contract
6 between the department and the agent for license, tag or permit issuance
7 service performed by the agent, \$1 each.

8 “(3) If the commission finds that an agent appointed pursuant to this
9 section has violated any of the provisions of law or the procedures prescribed
10 by the commission for the issuance of licenses, tags or permits or the col-
11 lection and disposition of fees therefrom, the commission may revoke the
12 authority of the agent to issue licenses, tags and permits, or may suspend
13 such authority for such time as the commission considers appropriate.

14 **“SECTION 5.** ORS 497.061 is amended to read:

15 “497.061. (1) Except as otherwise provided for by law, the State Fish and
16 Wildlife Commission shall charge the fees listed in the fee schedule under
17 this section for the issuance of the specified licenses, tags and permits.

14 “(d) Resident annual deer tag to hunt deer.

18 “(h) Resident annual mountain sheep tag to hunt mountain sheep.

3 issue each year one special tag that is auctioned to the highest bidder in a
4 manner prescribed by the commission for each of the following:

5 “(A) Mountain sheep;

6 “(B) Antelope; and

7 “(C) Mountain goat.

8 “(b) In addition to the tags referred to in paragraph (a) of this subsection,
9 the commission is authorized to issue each year one special tag that is
10 raffled in a manner prescribed by the commission for each of the following:

11 “(A) Mountain sheep;

12 “(B) Antelope; and

13 “(C) Mountain goat.

14 “(c) Moneys received under this subsection for:

15 “(A) Mountain sheep tags shall be placed in the Mountain Sheep Subac-
16 count established in ORS 496.303;

17 “(B) Antelope tags shall be placed in the Antelope Subaccount established

19 “(C) Mountain goat tags shall be placed in the Mountain Goat Subac-
20 count established in ORS 496.303.

22 mendation of the Access and Habitat Board to fulfill the board’s charge of
23 providing incentives to increase public access and habitat improvements to
24 private land, is authorized to issue each year up to 10 elk and 10 deer tags
25 to hunt deer or elk. The tags shall be auctioned or raffled to the highest
26 bidder in a manner prescribed by the commission. The Access and Habitat
27 Board, in recommending any tags, shall include a proposal as to the land on
28 which each tag can be used and a percentage of funds received from the tags
29 that may revert to the landowner if the tag is limited to private land. How-

7 with firearms, at the choice of the applicant. The commission may prescribe
8 by rule that the holder of such a tag is not authorized to take the game
9 animal by any other means than the tag so indorsed.

10 “(5) Except as provided in subsection (6) of this section, a person is not
11 eligible to obtain, in a lifetime, more than one controlled hunt tag issued by
12 the commission to hunt mountain sheep and one controlled hunt tag issued
13 by the commission to hunt mountain goat.

14 “(6) A person is eligible to obtain mountain sheep tags, antelope tags or
15 mountain goat tags described in subsection (2)(a) and (b) of this section, re-
16 gardless of whether the person has previously taken a mountain sheep,

9 “(10) If a controlled hunt for game mammals is undersubscribed during

11 cated tags to licensed hunters at up to four times the standard tag fee on a
