Dear Chair Fagan, Vice-Chair Heard, and Members of the Committee:

I am writing to you today on behalf of the Oregon Housing Alliance to express our strong support for SB 1532, which creates a Healthy Homes pilot program to support homeowners with low incomes.

The Oregon Housing Alliance is a coalition of ninety organizations from all parts of the state. Our members have come together with the knowledge that housing opportunity is the foundation on which all of our success is built – individual success as students, parents, workers, and community members as well as the success of our communities. We represent a diverse set of voices including non-profit housing developers, residents of affordable housing, local jurisdictions, and organizations working to meet basic needs in every corner of our state.

We believe that all Oregonians need a safe, stable, and affordable place to call home.

For seniors, people with disabilities, and people with low incomes, small investments in their home can make a big difference. These investments help maintain stability, improve their health outcomes, and protect the single family housing stock in our communities for the next generation. Across Oregon, our partners and members see homeowners with low incomes that are living in homes that are unsafe and in need of critical repairs. People are making difficult choices between paying their mortgage and putting food on the table, leaving critical repairs out of reach.

For some, their ability to use their home may be limited because repairs are needed – for example, a homeowner who may have recently needed to begin using a wheelchair or other mobility device may no longer be able to get in and out of their home because of a lack of a ramp, or may not be able to move the wheelchair throughout the home because of doorways which aren't wide enough. For others, their ability to access important weatherization assistance may be limited because there is no resource for home repairs which must be done prior to weatherization.

SB 1532 will make a strategic, \$4 million investment to address critical home repair and health and safety needs. SB 1532 funds several strategies to accomplish this work throughout Oregon. It will establish a fund which will be available by to non-profit organizations and local governments across Oregon to fund these health and safety needs. The bill also pairs funds

with energy efficiency programs delivered by the statewide network of Community Action agencies to maximize weatherization benefits. Together, SB 1532 will make critical and needed investments in our communities to help people with low incomes maintain safe and stable housing for the long term.

Investing in the basics – a safe, stable, affordable home for Oregonians with low incomes – has positive ripple effects across our state. We know what home, and what stable housing, means to all of us. When people have safe and stable housing, it has important and significant benefits. Kids are able to focus on the things that matter – being kids, doing their homework – instead of worrying about where their families will sleep at night. Parents are able to focus on work. Safe and stable housing that people can afford is key to accessing opportunity.

We urge you to support of SB 1532.
