Dear Chair Keny-Guyer, Vice-Chair Noble, Vice-Chair Williams, Members of the Committee:

I am writing to you today on behalf of the Oregon Housing Alliance to express our strong support for HB 4003, which is the recommendations for investments from the Task Force to Address Racial Disparities in Homeownership.

The Oregon Housing Alliance is a coalition of ninety organizations from all parts of the state. Our members have come together with the knowledge that housing opportunity is the foundation on which all of our success is built – individual success as students, parents, workers, and community members as well as the success of our communities. We represent a diverse set of voices including non-profit housing developers, residents of affordable housing, local jurisdictions, and organizations working to meet basic needs in every corner of our state. We believe that all Oregonians need a safe, stable, and affordable place to call home.

Today, we know that people of color experience disparate rates of homeownership. A lower percentage of people of color than whites have the opportunity to access homeownership, and the disparities are particularly apparent for Black Oregonians, Native Americans, and Latinx households. These barriers are the result of disparities in access to wealth, credit, housing discrimination, historical redlining practices, and more. Homeownership is one of the most common ways for people to build wealth and assets.

As a community and as a state, we need to remove barriers that exist for communities of color to access opportunity through homeownership.

HB 4003 lays out several critical steps to remove barriers. HB 4003 provides funding to Oregon Housing and Community Services for down payment assistance, outreach, and education. HB 4003 provides funding to expand access to homeownership through the Oregon Individual Development Account (IDA) Initiative, a proven tool to support homeowners of color as they work to save towards homeownership goals. HB 4003 also provides bias training to help address unconscious bias among real estate professionals such as realtors, mortgage lenders, and others. And, the bill extends the Task Force for another year. We are excited to see this proposal come forward, and want to express our strong support for the proposals included in this bill. We urge your support of HB 4003.

When people have equal access to safe and stable housing, free from historic inequities and discrimination, they realize important and significant benefits. Families and communities thrive when everyone has equitable access to opportunity and when we act to repair the damage of the past.
