House Committee on Behavioral Health Testimony in support of HB 4082 February 6, 2020, at 8:30 AM, Hearing Room E

Chair Greenlick, Vice-Chair Hayden, Vice-Chair Mitchell and Representatives Lively, Moore-Green, Salinas, and Stark:

The Oregon Commission on Hispanic Affairs (OCHA), and the Oregon Commission for Women (OCFW), in their roles of advocates for communities of color and women, strongly support HB 4082, which establishes a Behavioral Health (BH) Road Map Commission in Oregon's Legislative Assembly.

Oregon has taken many essential steps forward in improving the BH system, having passed five bills (SB 52, SB 707, SB 485, SB 918) regarding suicide prevention and care in 2019, and having established two legislative committees regarding Mental and BH in 2020. The Oregon Advocacy Commissions are in full support of the legislature's ongoing work to improve access and retention to BH services for all Oregonians. HB 4082 is the next important step that assures Oregon continues its leadership with engaged providers and recipients of BH treatment, with policy makers and decision makers to identify, analyze, engage, and recommend affordable ways to cover everyone.

OCHA has been working closely with culturally-specific provider stakeholders statewide, and its partners, OHA and DHS, to study MH and Latinos with OHA/DHS data from over 20 years of usage. The results show the essential nature of M & BH in the well-being of Latino youth and their families, who make up a robust segment of school referrals to MH specialists through school health clinics. An important part of making systems accessible to, and informed by underrepresented communities is by providing BH access in places where families of color, immigrants and refugees, and women routinely visit in their daily lives. A primary indicator of success for many immigrant and refugee communities is assuring access to culturally and linguistically relevant services, that include traumainformed care. We encourage you to add representatives of communities of color and of rural and frontier Oregon – those who experience the greatest disparities in accessing BH care that is appropriate in regards to cultural competency, language, and treatment modalities – to the statutory seats, as the legislature considers HB 4082. The participation of culturally-specific providers and consumers on the BH Road Map Commission will bring important and valuable insights and perspectives to this collaborative commission. Finally, we recommend including a leader experienced in advancing equity in BH on the new BH Road Map Commission.
