## Re: OPPOSITION to [SB 1555]

In addition to issues raised in my previous testimony on [SB 943A], I have additional concerns.

For the last several years there has been and to this day, an ugly war raging between the two sectors of Oregon's Economies; the High Technology / Service Economy versus the Resource Economy (agriculture, timber, forest products, and fisheries).

The High Technology / Service Industry entices thousands of people to migrate to Oregon looking to satiate their fortunes but when they get here, they find out there are only a finite number of "good-paying jobs."
