This analysis suggests that as many as 632,405 current voters can be attributed to the expansion of the Motor Voter program over a four-year period. That number represents a 29% expansion of the electorate when the program started in 2016. If you adjust the minor party threshold of 0.5% by reducing it proportional to the growth attributed to Motor Voter, the threshold would be 0.36%.

To reach a 0.5% threshold in July 2015, a minor party would need to have 10,817 voters. If a party had maintained that same number of voters over the same period, the threshold would need to be lowered to 0.38% to have the organization retain its minor party status after the surge of voters added through Motor Voter.

Policy Choices in HB 4026

Keeping the threshold steady at 0.5% requires a minor party to have at least 14,104 voters as of January 2020.

Reducing the threshold to 0.33% will require a minor party to have at least 9,402 voters as of January 2020.

Reducing the threshold to 0.25% will require a minor party to have at least 7,052 voters as of January 2020.
