I'm a civilian retiree of Gresham Police Department, and a senior citizen who increasingly must rely on public transportation. I remember when police officers were encouraged to ride the light rail, and could ride free by showing their badges. It was a safety measure for the light rail, easy on the officer who was going into Portland to testify in court or consult with a DA on one of their cases. It was expedient for everyone. That was then, this is now... the "now" when hate crimes are on the rise nationwide.

Fare Inspector jobs can be incredibly dangerous because they deal with lawbreakers. Fare inspectors are assaulted weekly. The Transit Police are the only ones who have their backs when they need help.

With this kind of threat, I can't imagine how it will be when the public learns HB 4097 will stop the police from being near them for protection.
