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## **About Redistricting**

Every 10-years following the release of U.S. Census data, Oregon's Legislature is tasked with redrawing congressional and state lines that are reflective of the state's population shifts to ensure each district has equal representation. In addition to Census data, the Legislature is supported by public testimony to ensure all Oregonians have a seat at the table and can make their voices heard.

## **About Maps Submitted**

These maps were submitted by <u>Rep. Andrea Salinas</u>, co-chair of the House Committee on Redistricting, and committee members <u>Rep. Khanh Pham</u> and <u>Rep. Winsvey</u> <u>Campos</u>. These maps were drawn in alignment with <u>statutory criteria</u>.

The maps are not final and are for the public to review and provide input. Committee members will go back to the drawing board following 12 virtual hearings held September 8-13.
