Co-Chairs Taylor, and Salinas, Vice-Chairs, Knopp, and Boshart-Davis, and members of the redistricting committees.

For the record my name is Tori Algee and my pronouns are she/her/hers. I am a resident of Hillsboro, House District 30, Senate District 15 and Congressional District 1. I have lived in Washington County for 20 plus years, and have seen immense growth over the last 10 years.

I've had the chance to look over the legislature's proposals, and some highlights that I wanted to share are within the House Proposal C. If this plan is adopted, I would still be in HD 30 under proposal C and I appreciate how the proposed district has gone more East to West, instead of the current district which goes more South and North, which has never made sense to me.

The shape really makes sense when I think about major roads I drive to get to and from work or go shopping- Evergreen Parkway, Cornell Road, Brookwood Pkwy, and Cornelius Pass are all right there connecting District 30 in proposal C just like they connect the places I go every day. I also appreciate that the new HD 30 in plan C includes the Intel campus. A lot of my neighbors and friends work there.

In regards to Plan B, I saw a lot of things that don't make sense to me. Specifically, Washington County has a lot of diversity between different communities and I believe that House Plan B links communities that do not have common concerns in terms of culture and income levels. For instance, where I live, housing has become increasingly expensive and my district is very dense, whereas other towns around here aren't as populated so the housing market is simply different. I want to ensure that whoever is my representative will understand the unique needs of my community and neighbors.

I also wanted to say a word about Congressional Maps. Washington county is a rapidly changing and growing county. The communities here are diverse, and we are extremely interconnected with other parts of the state. To the North and the East, many agricultural and logging communities exist with many connections with neighboring counties. Washington County has shared interests with our neighboring counties through forestry and the timber industry— we share the beautiful Tillamook Forest with neighboring Tillamook, Yamhill, and Clatsop Counties as well. I like that Plan A acknowledges that, and I don't like that Plan B leaves us boxed in and treats us like we aren't a part of a broader Oregon.

In closing I will say I know this job is complicated, so thanks to all of you for our work and I hope you will keep these things in mind while drawing final maps.
