For the record, my name is Elizabeth Heredia and I use she/her pronouns. I currently live in Keizer which is in House District 25, Senate District 13, and Congressional District 5.

During this past year, my life has changed significantly since bringing a new member into our family. After my son was born, my husband and I began to have more and more conversations about where he was going to go to daycare, school, or where we were going to take him to the park. Although I live in Keizer, the office where I work is in Woodburn which is about a 20-minute commute through 99E HWY.

Historically, the Salem-Keizer border seems one and the same, where folks who reside on either side of Salem Parkway Highway easily merge in order to access basic needs such as general grocery stores, medical services, or shopping stores. The communities who reside in these areas have similar shopping habits, speak the same language or practice the same religion. During the past few years, we've noticed how our neighbors and other members of the community have begun to be pushed out into areas more East where many share the same socioeconomic status.

While I appreciate some areas of the maps proposed, House Plan B raises many concerns, specifically in the Hayesville, Middle Grove, and Four Corners areas. House Plan B splits these communities right through the middle, not respecting the communities of interest that live parallel in those cities.
