I wanted to give you a quick update on similar investigations taking place in Vermont and New Hampshire.

Vermont

After Vermont citizens brought the EMF issue to their State House, the Vermont legislature tasked the Vermont Department of Health with investigating the EMF issue too.

It appears from the VDH report that they did not do the deep dive into the peer-reviewed independent scientific literature as the Oregon Health Authority will do; instead, their report seems to reflect information posted by [captured](#) federal agencies:

After reading their final report, [Rep. Timothy Briglin](#), who chairs the Vermont House Committee on Technology and Energy, asked the Rockefeller Center for Public Policy at Dartmouth College to do an independent investigation.

I had the opportunity to be interviewed by one of the team members who'd been on the project for several months already. At the end of our conversation I asked, based on the research she was seeing, whether she had changed any of her personal technology use habits. She no longer sleeps with her cell phone on and is taking other precautionary measures. Hopefully all our citizens will be given information soon to be able to make similar safe technology choices.

We are awaiting the final report of the Dartmouth investigation.

New Hampshire

The [New Hampshire Commission](#) is also well underway. They have been investigating the science and interviewing EMF experts since last fall and their meeting minutes can be found [here](#). Their February meeting minutes were scheduled to be approved in the March meeting, but that was postponed due to COVID-19. You can see speakers [here](#).

To Interested Parties:

Here is an update regarding progress on Senate Bill 283....

Despite the challenges of COVID-19 and the significant burden on OHA to manage the event, our agency is still working on the SB 283 mandate to "review peer-reviewed , independently funded scientific studies of the health effects of exposure to microwave radiation, particularly exposure that results from the use of wireless network technologies in schools or similar environments".

Last week, two highly qualified graduate student researchers, with strong backgrounds in public health and experience/formal academics in biostatistics/epidemiology, were on-boarded. In addition, two OHA staff, with considerable experience in epidemiology, toxicology, and radiation health physics, have been assigned to provide the graduate student researchers direction and supervision.

A formal project team kickoff meeting was held April 7, 2020. The four-member team will immediately begin the study review process which will last several weeks, followed by completing a report to an interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to education. [Note: In order to deal with unforeseen COVID issues, an agency request has been made to extend the required Legislative Assembly SB 283 report due date to April 1, 2021 (versus January 2, 2021). Approval is pending].

OHA appreciates the numerous source materials that have been submitted by interested parties. The research team will evaluate them for possible inclusion in the study review. OHA is confident that we have the needed resources to complete the review and report the results to the Oregon Legislature.
