

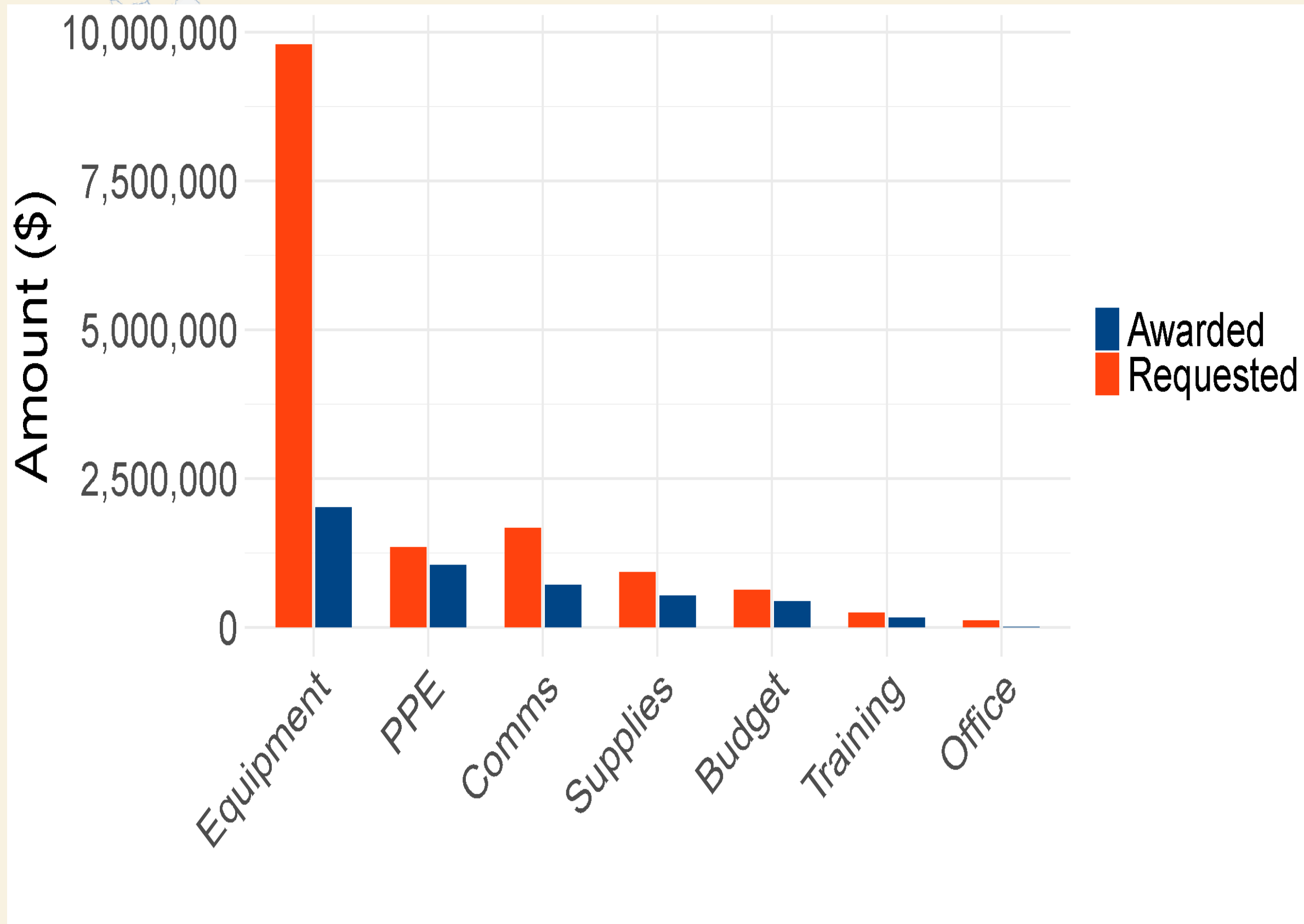
Senate Bill 762 Update

Wildland Urban Interface Grant



- OSFM received 144 applications.
- Funded 93 grants.
- \$14.7 million requested, \$4.9 million was awarded
- 65% of all applications received grant funds.
- 100% of fire service agencies who were directly impacted by 2020 received funding.



OSFM Initiatives Protecting & Preparing Communities



Fire Adapted Oregon

Preparing communities for fire by reducing community risk through education, resources, and investments.

Providing resources in strategic, data driven means to ensure that fire adaptation happens locally in ways that provide for vulnerable populations and Oregonians most at risk.



Response Ready Oregon

Improving the Oregon Fire Mutual Aid System by modernizing technology, systems, and increasing response system capacity.

Ensure response to incidents is rapid to minimize impact to communities and Oregonians.

Engine Program

Bolster firefighting capacity by purchasing apparatus

Soliciting feedback from the fire service to identify gaps and regions for strategic investments

Our system asks for Type 3 and Type 6 engines to support wildland fire operations.



762 Implementation

Defensible Space

Open and transparent process using ICC code, Chapters 603 and 604 as a baseline.

Will have defensible space code in place on or before December 2022

Designing self certification process and user interface.

Aligning code efforts with adjoining state agencies to ensure clarity and transparency.
